Awakening Faith (Shinjin) in Jodo Shinshu Buddhism Rinban Hoshu Y. Matsubayashi, Ed.D.

A famous Buddhist scholar, Dr. D.T. Suzuki, once said about the contribution of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism of Shinran Shonin, "Of all the development Mahayana Buddhism has achieved in the Far East, the most remarkable one is the Shin teaching of the Pure Land School. It is remarkable, chiefly, because geographically its birthplace is Japan and, historically, it is the latest evolution of Pure Land Mahayana, and therefore the

highest point it has reached."

One of the important characteristics of Mahayana Buddhism is the Bodhisattva ideals. The principal teaching of the Bodhisattva is to work for others for one's own benefit. It is important for all of us to work for others with compassion, just like Dalai Lama XIV encouraged us to practice when he visited Seattle recently. However, it is also important to realize and appreciate that we are living as the beneficiaries of such great compassion and work of others. Jodo Shinshu Buddhism was also established with the Bodhisattva Ideals by Shinran Shonin.

Shinran Shonin stated in the **Shoshin-ge** that Amida Buddha's light of great compassion always shines upon us untiringly and he reminded us to awaken to the great compassion and wisdom of Amida Buddha. When we are awakened, we are able to understand that "Samsara of birth-and-death is Nirvana." The **Shoshin-ge** states:

When Faith is awakened in the minds of ordinary people, They are made aware that Samsara of birth-and-death is Nirvana.

This is the ultimate attainment of Awakening Faith (Shinjin) in Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. However, in our rational understanding, the Samsaric world of birth-and-death is not the world of Nirvana because the Samsaric world is the defiled and unenlightened world; whereas Nirvana is the fully enlightened world. Shinran Shonin taught us that when our Faith is awakened in our minds, the world of Nirvana, Enlightenment, embodies the Samsaric world of birth-and-death and the Samsaric world becomes one with Nirvana.

The profound realization of the Dharma by Shinran Shonin is stated in the *Tannisho*: "When I carefully consider the Vow which Amida Buddha brought forth after five Kalpas' contemplation, I find that it was only for me, Shinran, alone! So, how gracious is the Original Vow of Amida Buddha who resolved to lead me to enlightenment, possessed of many Karmic evils!" On the other hand, Shan-Tao's profound realization of Human Natures is stated, "Know that we are, in reality, ordinary people of evils, subject to Birth-and-Death, having been ever sinking and ever transmigrating since immeasurable Kalpas up to the present, and that we have no chance for liberation." The author of the *Tannisho* reminds us that "these two kinds of profound realization are not a bit different" according to Shinran Shonin.

The essence of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism by Shinran Shonin is "Awakening Faith (Shinjin)" to the great compassion and wisdom of Amida Buddha; where we find "Samsara is Nirvana." This is the ultimate attainment in Jodo Shinshu Buddhism and also the highest point of the development of Pure Land Mahayana according to Dr. D.T. Suzuki. In this attainment, we find the world of Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu. Namo as ordinary people become one with Amida Buddha.

A devout Jodo Shinshu Nembutsu follower, Saichi Asahara, wrote a poem of oneness of Amida Buddha's heart (Nirvana) and his heart (Samsara) as follows:

My heart is your heart; your heart is my heart. It is your heart which becomes my heart.

June is the month of graduations and weddings. How wonderful it is for young people to be guided by the compassion and wisdom of Amida Buddha as they start their new life. Gassho

NOTES FROM DHARMA EXCHANGE - MAY 4, 11, 18, 2008

NOTE: The purpose of this column is to inform members who are unable to attend Dharma Exchange - parents, those who must attend committee meetings during this time, and spiritual seekers who access the Internet.

At the May 4th DX Jim Warrick sensei and MA Joe Schwab led a lively discussion on "other power" and "self power." Elmer talked about the author of the poem, Seiya, Takeko Kujo, which became a gatha used at our temple.

Elmer attributed his longevity to drinking Manchurian tea for 14 years, and suggested if we want to emulate him we should also drink it. * * *

Warrick sensei reported at the DX of May 11th on "An Evening with Dr. Nobuo Haneda from the Maida Center of Buddhism" on Friday, May 9, at the temple. Dr. Haneda commented on some interpretations of Hongan: i.e., "most desirable thing," "innermost aspiration," and "Primal Vow." Dr. Haneda remarked it is what makes us human. At the lecture he carefully read into the questions posed by attendees and was able to give incisive answers. Warrick sensei commented that to be happy is to make others happy, the basis of Mahayana Buddhism. A participant said we must aspire to learning and being a student. Wisdom comes from seeing change, letting go of concepts, learning from a bad situation as well as a good one, staying open and not letting ideas become fossilized. Sensei likened the Dharma to a flame. If the flame is contained within a globe it will result in blackening. * * *

On May 18 MA Joe Schwab introduced Sat Ichikawa who displayed a beautiful photo of Takeko Kujo, who wrote the poem, Seiya. He also shared a unique painting by her of plant forms mounted on a long, narrow piece of bamboo.

On May 19 the UW presented honorary degrees to those Nikkei students whose lives and studies were interrupted by the war and sent to camp. A participant queried, "Why now?" "Tetsuden Kashima, a UW professor of American ethnic studies, petitioned the regents to award the degrees after he and some UW library staffers researched the plight of the Nikkei students." Buddhism, Ecology, and Conservation

I have frequently stated the fact that to be a Buddhist is to be an ecologist. This is not ecology in a narrow sense but cosmic ecology, meaning everything is profoundly interrelated. We often say, "The Oneness of all existence." Since ecology is a science, I want to emphasize that Buddhism is not *just* science, but it incorporates science. To exercise our best judgment in making decisions, we need as much as possible to understand relationships and causality. Buddhists use the scientific method to gather information in order to make these sound and skillful decisions.

Behind all human actions are motives and the compelling motive in Buddhism is the compassionate elimination of pain and suffering (dukkha). In this regard, the Buddha is frequently called "The Great Physican." Buddhism is based on a medical model as formulated in the Four Noble Truths: 1. symptom (dukkha) 2. diagnosis; the problem is caused by selfish attachments 3. prognosis; a cure is possible 4. cure; The Eightfold Path. Like any skillful doctor, the Buddha as the Great Physician uses the technique and findings of science to investigate an illness and effect a cure. This technique is just as

applicable on the individual level as on the global level. In fact, Buddhism teaches that individual and global are profoundly interrelated. This is exactly what we mean when we talk about the Oneness of all life and non-duality.

In terms of the environmental crisis, the Buddha could be called "The Great Conservationist" who diagnoses selfish attachment as the source of the crisis and a firm commitment to global harmony and sustainability as the cure. The Buddha calls for global healing which in turn is healing ourselves. Recently, the Dalai Lama urged the United States and other wealthy countries to downscale our lifestyles and try to focus on inner contentment. To quote the Seattle Times article, "Because there are limitations on external material resources, but not on internal ones, it's better to seek contentment and peace rather than material things, he said." Thus, in conclusion, to be a Buddhist is to be both an ecologist and a conservationist. To me, ecology expresses wisdom and conservation expresses compassion. These are the two hands of Amida Buddha. Tread lightly on this fragile planet of ours.

TEMPLE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Mas Tahara

NW District Council

As all of you recall, BCA National Council and Ministers Association meetings were held in Portland, Oregon, with the Northwest District as the host district. The accounting of the event showed around \$20,000 in excess. NW District Council voted on May 17 to donate \$12,000.00 to BCA Campaign, credited to BCA Endowment's effort in supporting the Campaign. The meeting at Yakima Buddhist Temple clarified that the assessment for each temple is based on the actual number of members reported to BCA a year prior to the current fiscal year. The dues assessment for our temple is \$2,964.48 (\$5.33 x 556 members).

The 2009 NW District Buddhist Convention will be hosted by Oregon Buddhist Temple in Portland, OR, and 2010 Convention will be held at Ontario, OR, hosted by Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple.

Federation of Dharma School Teachers League Conference

Twelve Dharma School teachers attended the annual FDSTL Conference in San Mateo, CA on May 2-4, 2008. The attendees were Ann Hasegawa, Joan Nakano, Kari Ann Yokoyama, Marie Kosai-Luke, Joyce Kato. Susie Taketa, Julianne Tosava, Nina Tomita-Kato, Steph Oiima. Tina Zumoto-Ko, Lori Kozai and

Ron Hamakawa. The conference theme was "The Heart of Jodo Shinshu: Living a Triple "A" Life." where the three A's represent Awareness. Authenticity and Appreciation. The keynote address was given by Rev. Dr. David Ryo Matsumoto of the Berkeley Buddhist Temple and the Director of the Institute of Buddhist Studies - Center for Contemporary Shin Buddhist Studies. Congratulations to Lori Kozai (high school class) for being recognized by Socho Ogui for 10 years of service as a teacher.

In Workshop #1, we worked with clay, creating our own Buddha statues. We were given 32 physical characteristics of the historical Buddha, 80 secondary characteristics of the Buddha and 17 characteristics of the statue of the Buddha. Our second task was to create a Buddhist concept out of clay: enlightenment, Pure Land, compassion, interdependence, etc. In Workshop #2, Rev. Dr. David Matsumoto spoke



about Living a AAA Life. He talked about how Nagarjuna and Shinran presented the notion of the finger pointing to the moon. Without the finger, we could not see the moon. But, we should not mistake the finger for the moon. For Workshop #3, each delegate was asked to bring a story, poem or song that was meaningful to them. In addition to the three themed

workshops, evening sessions provided some extra fun, exercise and education with kamishibai, games, gathas and line dancing. New gathas, written by temple members, with contemporary rhythms were a hit. Each temple brought home a CD with music and lyrics to share with their Dharma Schools.

Although some had visited the Jodo Shinshu Center previously, the group took the opportunity to visit the JSC for a firsthand experience. We were welcomed by Glenn Kameda (Facility Manager) and Robert Noguchi (Campaign BCA-21st Century), who graciously gave us a tour of the Center.

As the Dharma School year comes to a close. the teachers will meet to share what was learned at the FDSTL conference and to plan for next year with new ideas. The teachers are very grateful for this retreat-like learning experience.
