#### Ohigan – the Land of Utmost Happiness (the Pure Land) Rimban Hoshu Y. Matsubayashi, Ed.D.

Ohigan in Japanese is an abbreviation of "To-Higan," which literally means "to reach the other shore." "O" of Ohigan is an honorific prefix in Japanese. The original Buddhist term for "Ohigan" in Sanskrit is "Paramita," which means "gone to the other shore; crossed, transcend; coming or leading to the opposite shore, complete attainment, perfection…" (Monier-Williams' *Sanskrit-English Dictionary*, p. 619) In Buddhism, the world of birth and death (Samsara) is referred to as "this shore" and the world of perfection (Nirvana) is called "the other shore." Therefore, Ohigan means to cross over to the other shore of the Buddha from this shore of the mundane world.

Smaller *Sukhavativyuha Sutra* describes the Land of the Buddha as the Utmost Happiness and how people living in the world of turmoil can reach this Land of the Utmost Happiness. This sutra is one of the three principal sutras of the Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. The Sanskrit term "Sukhavati" was translated into Chinese as "Gokuraku," which means "the Utmost Happiness" in English, by Tripitaka Master Kumarajiva of Yao Ch'in in 402 A.D. In the two Larger and Smaller *Sukhavativyuha Sutras* of the three principal sutras, the Land of the Utmost Happiness is described illustriously and those descriptions are artistic and religious. However, for those without insight of religious awakening, these descriptions of the Land of the Utmost Happiness are understood as the descriptions of fairy stories.

Smaller **Sukhavativyuha Sutra** states that "From here to the direction of the west, beyond ten billion Buddha-lands there is a land called the Utmost Happiness. In that land there is a Buddha named Infinite Light (Amitabha). He is now, at present, preaching the Dharma." In a history of the Pure Land Buddhism, the Utmost Happiness was expounded and commented by the Seven Masters and Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism.

The Second Master Vasubandha stated in his commentary, *The Discourse of the Pure Land*, that "I take refuge in the Buddha of Unhindered Light... and I wish to be born in the Pure Land of the Buddha." Master Vasubandhu described twenty nine adornments of the Land of the Utmost Happiness which he organized into three categories: seventeen adornments of the Land of the Buddha, eight adornments of the Amitabha (Amida) Buddha and four adornments of the Bodhisattvas. He explained the Dharma-nature as the virtue of the adornment of Purity, the One Dharma Phrase. Then, he concluded that the perfection of twenty-nine adornments in the three categories into the One Dharma Phrase of "**Purity**."

The Third Master T'an-luan used the expression of "the Pure Land" in his *Commentary on the Discourse on the Pure Land*. He replaced the Land of the Utmost Happiness with the term of "the Pure Land." Thus, among the Seven Masters of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, Master T'an-luan was the first to use the term of the Pure Land (Jodo) for the Utmost Happiness (Gokuraku). His intention of using the term of the Pure Land for the Land of the Utmost Happiness was to teach us the true meaning of the Land of the Buddha. His presentation of the Pure Land can be understood in our modern thinking as the demythologization of the Land of the Utmost Happiness.

As we observe the Ohigan Service, let us try to understand the true meaning of the other shore of the Buddha, the Land of the Utmost Happiness/the Pure Land. The other shore of the Buddha, where we are going to reach, is the Land of Purity and Compassion.

#### HAPPY CENTENNIAL, BWA

On Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> we will celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our Buddhist Women's Association in Seattle. It was founded here in May 1908 as the "Bukkyo Fujinbu" under the direction of Rev. Hoshin Fujii, one of the early Betsuin ministers with a "handlebar moustache" who served here from 1908-1922. There were nine original members and they paid annual dues of 25 cents per person. According to our Betsuin Centennial album, "Until 1930, the ministers were bachelors or men whose wives did not accompany them to this country. When Rev. Zenyu Aoki joined the leadership of the Betsuin, his wife became the first Fujinkai president in 1934. The tradition of having the minister's wife be the Fujinkai president continued until 1966, when Mrs. Hatsue Fukuda became the first Fujinkai president who was not a minister's wife."

Over the decades, our BWA grew into, by far, the largest affiliated organization of our temple guided by the following resolution issued at the first National BWA Convention in February 1952:

- 1. We shall constantly pursue the Buddha Dharma in order to follow a righteous way of life.
- 2. We shall mutually endeavor to establish a bright family and social atmosphere by living a life of Nembutsu.
- 3. We shall unite our efforts in order to promote Buddhism in America.

Besides being the main support group for temple activities, both our local and our national BWA are involved in diverse social welfare, charitable and educational activities.

We are very grateful for the profound and crucial role our BWA plays at Seattle Betsuin and we wish you continued success. Congratulations on preserving the spirit of Lady Takeko Kujo, the world BWA founder, who contributed the proceeds of "Muyuge", her classic book of poetry, to help fund the construction of Asoka Hospital in Japan. Truly, this is the working of Amida Buddha's Boundless Compassion.

#### NOTES FROM DHARMA EXCHANGE - July 27, August 3, 10, 17, 2008

The purpose of this column is to inform members who are unable to attend Dharma Exchange -- DS parents, committee members, and spiritual seekers who access the Internet.

Warrick sensei suggested we have a Q&A with the two Thai women who visited the Bestuin on July 27. They talked about some differences at their temple -- not many children attend; there are lots of statues; and the temple consists of three seating levels, one for the Buddha, the monks, and the Sangha which sits *seiza* on the floor. They have services for birth, death, and in May *Wesak* is celebrated. At home they light candles and pray to the Buddha. Praying means thanking him for what they have learned, not asking for favors. \* \* \*

Warrick sensei related an unusual event at the August 3 Dharma Exchange. On Saturday, August 2, a Mongolian Buddhist group held a joint service incorporating Jodo Shinshu with their tradition. Three ideas were of importance to them: (1) How to conduct oneself in the US, (2) Learn, learn, learn, and go home, and (3) the Buddha Dharma. Everyone was attentive at the 4-6pm service that concluded at 7:30pm. Warrick sensei thanked Rinban Matsubayashi and our sangha for allowing this service to take place. There are 500 Mongols in Seattle, but they have no temple yet. Their head lama has spoken at many temples, but he felt most at home at the Seattle Betsuin.

Elmer made known that to him, feelings are most important. Early on, he felt that by closing everyone and everything out he could be himself. He then played a Norwegian song, "River Elvin," on his harmonica. \* \* \*

On August 10, Rev. Castro related highlights of the BCA Ministers Association Seminar at the New York Buddhist Church founded by Rev. Hozen Seki. It was built on the grounds of actress Marian Davies estate on the Upper West Side. The group had a tour and lunch at the United Nations. Among the speakers were Dr. Robert Thurman of Columbia University, and writer Clark Strand, former editor of *Tricycle* magazine who indicated Jodo Shinshu has had the most influence on his Buddhist outlook. He teaches a class on the Buddhist perspective on

Christianity. [For complete and interesting details of the Seminar see July issue of Wheel of Dharma.]

Sensei recalled the re-enactment of the bombing (with a sack of flour) of Hiroshima. He felt the cheers from the crowd seemed barbaric and was shocked at how crude and unthinking humans can be. He pointed out the only US holiday entirely devoted to peace is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

We, as a nation, are convenience-oriented and possess a woeful lack of interest and knowledge of history.

Sensei talked about a coming-of-age book, *At Hell's Gate* by Claude Anshin Thomas who was a soldier in Viet Nam and later became a Zen monk.

While Elmer lived in Japan he read a book about how to die. He said every page dealt with that subject.

On August 17, Rev. Castro welcomed home from Japan two participants. He also continued the subject of the Olympic Games, which was his Dharma talk. Following are some comments from participants: •A woman sees a warfield where one country is pitted against other countries -- win at any cost at the Olympics. •Another felt the US has dominated Asian countries for their resources for many years and is pleased to see China emerging. Another was most impressed with the Opening Ceremony. A comment was made that unbeknownst to many, much was computer generated. • A participant was irked by a television reporter asking a silver medalist how she felt about not winning, when in fact, she won a silver medal. •Sensei said unlike some Buddhist sects, Jodo Shinshu acknowledges that we have an ego and are powerless to lose it. The purpose of the Special Olympics Marathon is to finish the race, not to compete with each other. •The late Jim Akutsu, the temple's girl's basketball coach, had complained he couldn't get the girls to shoot. They kept passing the ball around. Were they just being polite? Or as one wag put it, if they missed they'd be "killed" by their teammates.
