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# Should We Emphasize Evil Person?

On July 14, the Wednesday before this year's Bon Odori weekend, I was visited by Rev. Masumi Kikuchi from Japan. Rev. Kikuchi served with the Buddhist Churches of Canada but resigned due to health problems and returned to Japan. She is presently working on her Ph.D. at our Hongwanji-related Ryukoku University in Kyoto and she came to the U.S. to conduct research for her doctoral dissertation. As part of her research, she interviewed me for over 3 hours (actually we had lunch together too). Rev. Kikuchi's research concerns how Jodo Shinshu can be expressed in English in a way that will keep its authentic character while also appealing to a modern North American temperament. She is also investigating the history of Jodo Shinshu propagation in English. During our conversation, we both agreed that early efforts in Hawaii and the Mainland focused far more on "general Buddhism" and there was a much smaller flavor of authentic Jodo Shinshu until the 1970's. When I enrolled at the Institute of Buddhist Studies in 1973, it was hard to find very many Jodo Shinshu texts in English. Today, I can't keep up with the wonderful publications of Jodo Shinshu material.

We need to appreciate the fact that Jodo Shinshu Buddhism has a distinct and unique personality; a doctrinal fingerprint. What sets us apart in certain ways from other Buddhists is not a modern development. Many of the same themes we address today were issues at the time of Shinran as well. Rev. Kikuchi asked me if I think Jodo Shinshu's emphasis on "the evil person" turns people away from our teaching. I replied that we have to be careful how we introduce our teaching to newcomers. If I tell someone new that our teaching offers salvation to the evil person they may very well be turned off. However, if I tell them the essence of our teaching is an awakening to gratitude, their first impression of our teaching may be more favorable and certainly no less accurate. Recent psychological studies of gratitude have shown how important it is for our mental health and happiness.

People who become interested in Buddhism are often moving away from something else. If what they are investigating appears too much like what they are rejecting, they will keep looking. Shinshu's salvation for the evil person and fundamentalist Christianity's salvation for the sinner superficially seem similar. However, there are crucial areas where we completely differ and one of these areas is the issue of judgment. From the very beginning, Amida Buddha is not a judge but is

the working of boundless wisdom and compassion doing everything possible to bring about our liberation from pain and suffering (dukkha, skt.). In Buddhism, judgment is a function of our discriminating mind; an egotistic attachment we do to ourselves. In fundamentalist Christianity, it is taught that Christ died for our sins, but God had previously imposed the legalistic standard of sin in the Ten Commandments. In Buddhism, we are motivated by the desire to eliminate dukkha in ourselves and others. We do not need the threat of punishment.



**Notes on Dharma Exchange** Dharma Exchange takes place from 11:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. after Sunday Service in the dining room. All are welcome to attend this opportunity for discussion and questions. Discussion is typically led by Reverend Castro, Reverend Warrick, or Minister's Assistant Joe Schwab and often follows a theme that was presented in the Dharma Talk presented in the service immediately prior. These notes are intended for those who are unable to attend Dharma Exchange -- Dharma School parents, Japanese service attendees, committee members, etc.

#### June

27 - A long discussion ensued concerning gays and marriage led by Joe Schwab, M.A.

A participant commented that many gays are not seeking a legal definition, but rather are asking for a spiritual commitment in a marriage ceremony.

**July 4** - A participant liked the ideas of "interdependent" and "impermanence" brought into Rev. Castro's Dharma message. The Buddhist feeling toward fireworks is that they are beautiful briefly then they die. He talked about water disputes in Buddhist scriptures causing people to go to war. The Buddha saw both sides of the issue and negotiated.

Irene G. discussed the Orion Center for homeless youth. Various organizations take turns providing meals. The Betsuin provides a meal on the third Friday of the month.
