Our Common Humanity

This morning, I participated in the Seattle Keiro Garden Groundbreaking Ceremony. Nikkei Concerns CEO Jeffrey Hattori did an excellent job coordinating the ceremony and acting as M.C. The event began with a Shinto ceremony followed by "blessings" by Rev. Derek Nakano, Senior Pastor at Blaine Memorial United Methodist Church on behalf of the Japanese Christian community and by me on behalf of the Japanese Buddhist community. The garden is going to be very beautiful as well as functional, since it is located just outside the rehab facility as a safe and secure place to walk with cane or walker or be pushed in a wheelchair.

Beginning the Groundbreaking Ceremony with a Shinto ceremony made me think about the relationship of Shinto and Buddhism in Japan. Prince Shotoku, known as the "Father of Japanese Buddhism," was opposed by Shinto forces when he promoted Buddhism in the 6th century. Buddhism flourished, however, and over the centuries some of the most devout adherents of Buddhism were some of the emperors and empresses of Japan. Shinto was absorbed and transformed by some of the Buddhist sects and very much eclipsed by Buddhism, although Jodo Shinshu completely disassociated itself from Shinto influence.

While initially a fertility cult, Shinto was transformed over the centuries through its encounter with Confucianism and Buddhism. With the return of the Emperor to power after the fall of the Shogunate in the late 19th century, a new nationalistic interpretation of Shinto called "State Shinto" emerged and Emperor Meiji declared that Shinto should have absorbed Buddhism rather that the opposite. He tried to destroy Buddhism and, at one point, declared that all Buddhist temples should be shut down. State Shinto ended with Japan's surrender at the end of WW II.

Today, the Shinto religion seems to have generally returned to its concern with invoking spirits of protection and good fortune; although there is still a vibrant strain of Shinto nationalism in Japan. Certain Buddhist sects, too, engage in invoking protection and good fortune, but Jodo Shinshu does not do so directly. Protection and good fortune are side benefits of enlightenment not goals in themselves. My "blessing" at Keiro was to invoke the spirit of enlightenment, "May the spirits of all the enlightened ones dwell in this garden. We joyfully scatter flower petals of welcome."

I thought back twenty five years to the initial groundbreaking ceremony for Keiro that Rinban Ouchi, Rev. Nakagaki and I participated in. I thought about all the warm and inspiring events, residents, volunteers and staff who have left their legacy to us; the late Jim Komura, for instance, who was so active with Keiro and our Betsuin when I first arrived in Seattle in 1986, and the late Nobue Shimizu who just last week recited the Nembutsu with me at Keiro only two days before she died. "May their spirits, the enlightened spirits of all the selfless Keiro contributors and the spirits of all the Enlightened Ones in the ten directions welcome you to the new Keiro garden. This is the spirit of Buddhism and the enlightened spirit of our common humanity.

Fall Higan Service: Great! To those of you who attended the Fall Higan service, I thank you! The weather was just right, with the rain freshening up the landscape the night before. Hustling Sangha members coming as the Bonsho was being rung. I stepped into the rear of the Hondo to join in the special service. The Naijin was full of Ministers and assistants, the Sangha members filled the pews, with the Betsuin choir in the front. Our choir had an "A" day, with the piano and a violinist in accompaniment, it sounded great. You just had to be there.

Kuwahara Sensei from the Institute of Buddhist Studies was the guest speaker, who spoke to our children and adults, and delivered a message to the Japanese members also. Ministers were busy with Dharma Exchange, Dharma school and a Dharma school parents exchange too. Following all of this the Boy Scout fall session began, wow what a temple! 2011 Nembutsu Camporee Submitted by Connie Ozeki-Chinn and Susie Taketa. It was a typical Northwest summer day – is it going to rain? The clouds won't go away, oh look, is that blue sky? But the weather didn't dampen the spirits of the campers as they arrived at Camp Waskowitz, in North Bend, Washington (about 40 minutes east of Seattle). Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and others from various youth groups (e.g. YAC retreat participants) at BCA Temples arrived for the 2011 Nembutsu Camporee. The event was held on August 5-7 and hosted by Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple.

Delegates from all over the west coast participated in the program themed "Exploring Eco-Sangha." Discussions of conservation and being mindful of our carbon footprint were incorporated into a variety of mixers, activities, and services.



After ice breakers and making s'mores over an open pit by the river, the campers were led down a lantern lit path to a rustic, covered shelter with a roaring fire and lanterns hanging all around. This was the venue for Opening Service led by Youth Ministers Assistants from the Northwest. The Juseige was chanted by flashlight and the campers were inspired to think about the earth and being eco-minded.

Socho Ogui and Rinban Castro arrived on Saturday for morning service. After service, group pictures were taken with Socho and Rinban before heading into activities, including an eco-scavenger hunt, relay games, making clothes items, bags and pillows from recyclable plastic bags, swimming and creating skits. After dinner, skits were presented, and then the campers played bingo and other games, sang karaoke, and created friendship bracelets. The campers were then treated to a "musubi bar". Adult leaders made musubi, with the choice of ume, furiikake, Spam or nori to eat with the musubi. The Gohan was a hit!

The program ended Sunday morning with a brief service, again led by the awesome Youth Ministers Assistants, and a slide show summarizing the events of the weekend. The campers cleaned their assigned areas, leaving the camp grounds as clean as or cleaner than when they arrived, all in keeping with the theme of being eco-minded. The next Nembutsu Camporee will be in 2013 hosted by the Coast District.

<u>Seattle Buddhist Church Board of Directors' Nominations</u>: submitted by Nominations Committee. Annual elections for the Seattle Buddhist Church Board of Directors will be held starting this November with a voting results announced at the General Meeting held in December. If you are interested in becoming a Board member for the Seattle Buddhist Church please see the below:

- a) Board nominees must be "Regular" members of the Temple who are considered to have paid at least the minimum recommended amount for the "Ijikai" dues for the 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 fiscal years. This has been \$300 per individual who is 69 years of age and under and \$250 for individuals who have reached the age of 70 or over.
- b) The term for an elected Board member is a 3 year commitment.
- c) Meetings are currently held at a minimum of six (6) times a year or additional meetings as needed and Board members and the expectation is for members to attend all meetings but no less than half of the meetings during their term. Meetings are typically the fourth (4th) Thursday of the month with changes as needed to accommodate calendar scheduling.

Notes on Dharma Exchange Dharma Exchange takes place from 11:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. after Sunday Service in the dining room. All are welcome to attend this opportunity for discussion and questions typically led by Reverend Castro, Reverend Warrick, or Minister's Assistant Joe Schwab.

August 28, 2011. Laverne conducted the DX and discussed the Three Fold Refuge. She really understood the children's Dharma message early on -- "Don't believe all that you are told." Laverne realized impermanence on the death of a relative... She said there is a Dharma message in everything that happens to us... A participant, referring to Dr. Alfred Bloom, said, "Even a scholar can become a Buddhist.". . . A new study group, The Tuesday Dharma Study Group will meet weekly starting Tuesday, Sep. 20 and run through Oct 18. The first subject will be Taitetsu Unno's booklet, "Gratitude: Its Source and Power." Laverne has free copies for the asking as well as information on the new group. . . Rev. Jim Warrick suggested we promote a "Bring a friend to Temple Sunday."... Too busy? Go online to www.seattlebetsuin.com for news on many temple activities.

September 4, 2011. Rinban Castro talked about the lifetime members who are unable to come to the temple any longer. He suggested we need to continue the Outreach Program that the late Richard Kitashima headed. ... The theory that the Dharma declined right after Buddhism became less prevalent is called *Mappo*.... Warrick sensei feels we should get to know each other better, especially the senior members. That way we would really care about each other and really be engaged with each other. Irene G. thinks we are progressing in that direction. Sense likened coming to the temple to becoming an in-law in a new family. The new person is first looked upon with uncertainty and later becomes an accepted member of that family. . . Laverne reminded us of the new Tuesday Dharma Study Group (See 8-28 above for details.)

September 11, 2011. Castro sensei stated Buddhism is about dukkha (suffering and problems) and the cessation of same -- it is not about beliefs. Sensei read a Seattle Times article of 9-3 about Governor Perry's take on Gallileo. All beings are identical in one sense -- the truth of Enlightenment exists, and a vehicle for it is the Nembutsu. Universal Enlightenment is Amida Buddha.

September 18, 2011. Rev. Warrick conducted the Dharma Exchange after having returned from Florida and Georgia visiting family.

Guest minister Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara from CA drew a parallel between falling leaves and a new life beginning. . . Addressing "picture brides," Warrick sensei recommended The Buddha in the Attic and When the Emperor was Divine, both by Julie Otsuka. Rev. Julie said the stories of many "picture brides" are often sad as there was nothing they could do to change their situation. Even today, according to a participant, there are gobetweens who arrange marriages. Ms Otsuka will speak at the Seattle Central Library, 9-23 at 7pm. Her next book will be on the internment of Japanese Americans during WWII. . . Irene G. spoke of a woman from Japan who complained about life in the US and found things had changed when she returned to Japan. It was then she realized life was good here. In gassho, Pat Bobrow
