Behind Every Successful Woman

On September 29, our Buddhist Women's Association and our temple will be sponsoring the first of what I hope will be an annual Fall Conference with the title "Being Buddhist in a Christian Society: Focus on Women." While the emphasis will be on a woman's perspective, with a theme like this, both genders will find our conference interesting and relevant.

As I was thinking about writing this article while I was driving to the temple, I noticed a bumper sticker on the car in front of me: "Behind every successful woman is herself." As I read it, I thought to myself, "Could it be that successful women don't have fathers? Or, might it be that women are successful in spite of their fathers...and all other men in their lives including teachers, ministers, store clerks, garbage collectors, doctors, etc.?" I guess this bumper sticker is the female equivalent of the notion of a "self-made man."

One of the cornerstone teachings of Buddhism is interdependence which is referred to by a number of terms such as "mutual co-arising", "mutual co-dependence", etc. The first words spoken at my ordination ceremony at the Hongwanji in 1975 were, "You have been brought here by profound

causes and conditions." Recognizing and appreciating the causes and conditions that lead us to the Dharma is the essence of our ever-deepening Jodo Shinshu life. The depth of our gratitude is directly related to our appreciation of the nature, significance and value of what we have received. When we receive the Dharma, we are able to understand that even painful experiences in our life are manifesting boundless wisdom and compassion. The notion of a self-made man or woman, from a Buddhist point of view, is a fiction and cannot lead to any deep sense of gratitude.

President's Message By Yukio Morikubo

In Japanese, "okaeri!" or "welcome home!" is the phrase that a family member would say to greet another who returns home. It's said casually, but reminds the returnee that he or she is valued and belongs.

I think about that phrase every
September, when Dharma School students
return "home" to the Betsuin with the start of
the new school year. Whether on their own or at
their parents' urging, our Dharma School students
return to see friends and to attend service and
classes. Our Dharma School parents, Board and
dedicated superintendents and teachers renew their
commitment to surreptitiously teach our children
Jodo Shinshu principles and life skills that will
empower them to deal with hardship in life, and to
thrive and be happy. This is possibly the most
important thing we do at the Betsuin.

The phrase is also one that applies to you even if you aren't a Dharma School student. The imagery of coming home to the Betsuin fits because at the Betsuin, you are valued and you belong.

Many, many people work hard to make the Betsuin your home. They include, of course, our

current ministers and ministers 'assistants -- Rimban Don Castro, Reverend Jim Warwick, and minister's assistants Joe Schwab and Irene Goto. These teachers give amply of themselves to share with us their hard-earned insights into the Dharma.

They also include lay people like you and me. Our religious services and

particularly our Japanese services would not be nearly as strong as they are without the hard work and dedication of our Religious Department and its head, Alan Hoshino. The Religious Department works with our ministers to develop programming that is relevant and thought provoking. Alan also does an outstanding job of recording English and Japanese messages and of presenting Japanese language messages at our weekly services. As a result, we have rich Jodo Shinshu content that we can all access for free on the Betsuin's website.

To ensure our facilities are in good, working order, our Facilities Committee continuously inspects, cleans, paints and fixes our temple, gym and grounds. Today, committee members include continued on page 8...

Shirley announced the yearly Lantern Ceremony on Green Lake on August 6 to commemorate the A-bombs dropped on Japan. She circulated photos of past year's event. . . John L is helping a young woman at the North American Post in her research of the late peace activist Floyd Schmoe. If you know anyone who is able to reach his survivors, please let John L. know.

August 19 - Rev. Jim Warrick conducted the service and Dharma Exchange. Gail K. liked the tie-in of sensei's talk with the Persian quote about ignorance. Sensei described in detail the difference between "ignorance" and "stupidity." The former indicates a lack of knowledge, and the latter refers to acting against better judgment when one has the knowledge. He posed the question, "How do we let someone know they are full of themselves?" It recalled the story of the Zen monk who allowed the tea he was pouring to flood the area. What to do when we feel burned out in our work? It was suggested being creative.
