Bon Odori: Come Rain or Come Shine

Seattle summers are short and sweet. I don't know of a better climate in the summer than here. Yes, it has rained a few times in recent years at Bon Odori but, with the right attitude, our dancers have made the best of it. I remember one soaked mother and daughter a few years ago at the end of the evening's dancing. Their yukata was soaked and their hair was plastered to their foreheads yet their faces were beaming with a smile. "This is the best Bon Odori ever. We will always remember this one!" Mother and daughter are now a few years older. Maybe soon the daughter will move away to attend college. Maybe she will get a job and settle in another city but that shared experience of turning lemons into lemonade is a memory they will cherish.

I have told our Dharma School children, "If there is one expression from your temple experience that you remember, let it be 'Out of the mud grows the lotus." Of course, I also hope they remember the nembutsu as an expression of transformation and gratitude. Actually, the nembutsu and the expression "Out of the mud grows the lotus" are identical as expressions of gratitude and transformation. Shinran Shonin talks about "rubble into gold." Because of the mud, the lotus is able to become. Because of my blind passions, Amida Buddha exists.

If you look at the six character myogo (scroll central object of reverence) "na-mo-a-mi-da-butsu." you will notice that it rises vertically from a lotus flower (see the metal copy of Shinran Shonin's writing in our nokotsudo mausoleum). Out of our blind passions arises the perfect lotus of transformation expressed as the nembutsu. Without mud, there is no lotus. Without our blind passions, there is no Amida Buddha. Let's hope for clear skies this year with that gorgeous deep blue at dusk which only happens in the summer. Maybe throw in a full moon rising over the temple for good measure. However, come rain or come shine, "Namo Amida Butsu."



## Summer Music Service: Sunday, July 7, 2013 Seattle Betsuin Ukulele Band and Betsuin Choir, Bodhi Ensemble Including an Encore Performance of Imagine

### NOTES FROM DHARMA EXCHANGE

SUN, MAY 12 - The Dharma School Dads conducted the Mothers' Day Service in the Hondo. . . During Dharma Exchange Rinban Castro commented that all of us should be able to conduct a service because we are all on the same path. A hollow fish was struck while sensei waited for a bus in Japan, and he said it was so enchanting for him -- a reminder of "Old Japan."... Complaining, griping, moaning, etc. is called "monku." The opposite of monku is "Kansha"(gratitude),and "arigato" means "difficult to be." He commented that the seldom used "much obliged" is more Buddhistic in tone than other forms of expressing gratitude. He recalled Ouchi sensei saying "arigatai" frequently. For such a gentle person it is hard to comprehend he was training to be a kamikaze pilot toward the end of WWII. The last word of a kamikaze pilot was "Mom," not "banzai" as we hear in films. . . While undergoing ministerial training sensei worked in some hospitals and found the one in Santa Clara was very clean and the one in Oakland was dirty. He was shocked by dustballs behind the surgery door.

SUN, MAY 19 - Rev. Jim Warrick talked about the theme in the Hondo, Gotan-e, celebrating the birth of Shinran Shonen, the founder of the Jodo Shinshu sect in Japan. . . While discussing "light" he said the first filaments for electric light bulbs were made of bamboo. Also, the oldest known functioning light bulb is 104 years old and is in California. Sensei said Amida Buddha represents the highest form of Wisdom and Compassion.

SUN, JUNE 2 - Two large screens were used in the Hondo for the photos and names of deceased members of the temple during the All Sangha Memorial Service. They enhanced the experience with technology. Now, anyone can submit names/photos to the office at any time of the year to be exhibited at the next Memorial Service. . . How can we become one with Amida Buddha? Loved ones are the spirit of Amida Buddha as they share their love of family members. . . Kemi N. displayed a scroll she inherited, and has given it to the Seattle Betsuin. Monshu Koshin Ohtani presented it to Kemi's grandparents. Her grandfather, Hideo Kaneko, was one of the founders of the Palo Alto Buddhist Temple. The characters on the scroll are "Cho Zetsu," which means "superlative transcendent." In the past, she donated a scroll to the Palo Alto Buddhist Temple.

SUN, JUNE 9 - Rinban Castro opined that the longest journey we will take is from the head to the heart. . .While at a retreat in Portland sensei visited an impressive facility in Boring, Oregon, where dogs are trained for the blind. Sensei was overwhelmed by what he learned. Labradour Retrievers and Golden Retrievers are the preferred breeds because of their gentle nature. The pups stay with a family for one year and begin training at 10 weeks of age. Those families said they could only part with the dog because they knew it would be assisting a blind person. Not all the candidates become guide dogs -- hyper dogs are trained for search & rescue. The entire operation of the facility is paid for by donations from the Kiwanis Club, Lions Club and other corporate groups.

SUN, JUNE 16 -Rosalie Town ran the Dharma Exchange after her Dharma talk in the Hondo. . . A participant talked about the many ways people help each other. She told of a senior woman who thanked each of the sanitation workers individually at a gathering in New York. A participant asked Rosalie how to cultivate a positive attitude. Rosalie related that Castro sensei gave the Dharma talk when she first visited the Betsuin, and everything "clicked." She felt more at peace and happier. Another participant said he doesn't know where he would be now had he not come to the temple. A participant recounted the story of the Husky Crew in 1936 when they won gold in the Olympic Games. The crew was composed of just ordinary, humble guys who were unable to pay their way to the Games. Sports writer Royal Brougham launched a campaign to raise money to send the crew to the Olympic Games.
