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The Sarana Affirmation Ceremony: Taking Refuge in Buddhism

Those who have taken refuge in the Buddha see with right knowledge the Four Noble Truths concerning dukkha (pain and suffering), the cause of dukkha and the path which leads to the end of dukkha.

No matter how old or young, those who follow the path of enlightenment shine bright over the world like the full moon in a clear sky. --Dhammapada

On October 6 Seattle Betsuin will hold a Sarana Affirmation Ceremony where participants take refuge in the Three Treasures of Buddha, Dharma and Sangha, and receive a Dharma Name (popularly called a "Buddhist Name"). The application form is in this newsletter. We are taking advantage of the visit to Seattle that weekend by Bishop Kodo Umezu who will conduct the ceremony.

According to Buddhist tradition, one of the Ten Fetters binding us to this world of birth-and-death is a need to rely on rites and rituals. In other words, to become a Buddha or a Buddhist for that matter, you don't need to go through any rituals. You are a Buddhist if you consider yourself a Buddhist. Why, then, would a person want to participate in the Affirmation Ceremony? I'm sure there are many more reasons than I know but here are a few that would motivate me to participate:

- 1. You are able to receive a Dharma Name which you choose in consultation with your minister. Our Dharma Name reminds us of our spiritual goals, ideals or vision.
- 2. Through this ceremony, it helps us appreciate that we are part of a spiritual-cultural heritage that is over 2,500 years old. I think this is a thrilling experience.
- 3. It's great to publically declare yourself a member of a team you believe in, i.e. a Sangha. To paraphrase President Kennedy, "Ask not what your Sangha can do for you. Ask what you can do for your Sangha." This puts me in mind of the theme of our Second Annual Buddhist Women's Seminar on October 19: "Rita no Kokoro: The Mind that Benefits Others." In benefitting others, we benefit ourself.
- 4. It lifts everyone's spirit to see members who care enough about the Sangha to make a public declaration of their commitment.





NOTES FROM DHARMA EXCHANGE

June 23 - Rinban Castro commented on the value of music as espoused in the study of ethnomusicology. . . Grace and Sat brought a scroll signed by Rennyo Shonin for display during the Bishops and Rinbans' service in the Hondo. To better conceive of the time frame, Sensei indicated it was during the life of Columbus that Rennyo designed relatively small scrolls for the families in the sangha to hang in their obutsudans. . . Many BCA ministerial families are connected through birth and marriage. . . A video, "Streams of Light," [directed by Rev Kentaro Sugao] was noted by Kemi N., who hopes to show it to a wider audience in the future.

June 30 - Rev. Jim Warrick talked about the radical monk, known as "the bin Laden of Burma." Several other countries are involved in riots as well, with Muslims being the target. Sensei asked, "How do these tragedies happen?" What can one do? It becomes an individual choice. He suggested approaching our leaders to reach peaceful resolution with their leaders. He suggested that ignorance is the beginning of anger. Hate and fear are signs of confronting the unknown, and passion overtakes wisdom. Further, if one truly knows the enemy, he is not an enemy. . .Sensei recounted some highlights of a trip to Great Britain. He and Rona visited Stonehenge, Cardiff Castle, many monasteries, Warrick Castle, and Hadrian's Wall, constructed in 122 A.D. It runs from coast to coast and is 20 feet high and 75 miles long.

July 7 – Minister's Assistant In Training Matt May responded to questions regarding his dharma talk which he gave at the Music Service the same day. Matt was first introduced to Tibetan Buddhism by the Beastie Boys song, *Bodhisattva Vow*, rapped by Adam Yauch who died in 2012. Matt recited the lyrics on request. He said that synchronized reading (without music) and illiteracy occurred together as a means of memorizing sutras and conveying them. As they are passed along cultures and generations they change and we don't need to get locked-in to one version. Several attendees expressed their appreciation for Matt's tying together music and chanting to relate the dharma. Rev Castro said that poetry and music are reservoirs for religious experience. July 14 - Rinban Castro held forth today after the Hatsubon service, and Grace I. said she was happy that sensei explained the real meaning of various Japanese terms i.e., itadakimasu, arigato, okagesama-de. etc. Sensei said he felt all those terms connoted team work. Kiyo T. also liked the Dharma message about sensei's feeling of being privileged to be part of so many lives. . . Sensei recalled the quandary about the Redwoods and how Nature's way is to burn and start over, but the populous wishes to preserve these gigantic trees, in conflict with Nature. . .Kemi N. said the African community has a tradition similar to Jodo Shinshu in offering Koden. . . John, a regular at the temple, is a cultural geographer, one who studies people and their land, and how rice and other products reflect in their behavior. . . There were about 100 kids in the Kids Summer Program (KSP), and about one-half of them from the Dharma School. . . Sensei said the pillow service ennobles the life of the deceased. A gentleman who did not observe any formal religion told Sensei he had to have some ritual for his beloved wife. . . Sensei said when he becomes 80 he will start piano lessons. Gayle K. urged him to start music lessons now and not wait. . .Florence S. asked why Buddhists have memorial services customarily at night. Sensei recalled that when he first came to the Betsuin, casket services were replaced by evening memorial services. People worked during the day. Sensei, his sister and brother arranged a service for their mother at the fundamentalist church she attended. They each told the minister they would like to say a few words. They were told this church was "gender specific," which means women don't speak at their services.
