Unconditional Means Unconditional

What part of unconditional do you not understand? Maybe, all of it! Amida Buddha's boundless wisdom-compassion is truly inconceivable. Be that as it may, at our BCA Ministers' Meeting and Seminar in Chicago in August, I raised the question of using the term "unconditional love" as one way of referring to Amida Buddha in order to promote interfaith dialogue. It has been my experience that Japan-born ministers tend to mistrust the word "love" and to associate it with its more base meaning of romantic love (eros) rather than its most sublime sense of unconditional love (agape) which is the love of God.

Having been raised Christian I found it impossible to reconcile divine, unconditional love with a God who would condemn me to hell for renouncing Christianity and becoming Buddhist. Don't I detect some conditions here? Someone told me of a sign held up by a Christian evangelist at Pike Place Market a few years ago that read, "Jesus' love is NOT unconditional. You have to believe." Actually, whether I believe or not, it does not take away from Amida's unconditional love for me, "embraced never to be abandoned."

Needless to say, the unconditional nature of Jesus or Amida is extremely important when we address the issue of inclusiveness. At our Chicago meetings, the ministers discussed issues of homosexuality, gay marriage and gays in scouting. It has probably been around a decade since our ministerial association endorsed gay marriage and we certainly have no problems including gays in scouting. When I returned to Seattle and opened my emails, however, I discovered an article sent to me by one of our scouting parents with the headline, "Fox's Huckabee To Keynote Event For Anti-Gay Boy Scouts Alternative."

Over the years, I have so often heard our Japanese speaking members express "sono mama" meaning "just as I am" with joy and gratitude. If we can keep this unconditional spirit foremost in our minds, there is no danger Jodo Shinshu will not prosper. This is truly the spirit of the Nembutsu.

CREDIT CARDS ACCEPTED

The Seattle Buddhist Church will be accepting credit cards as a method for individuals making a transaction for their ljikai dues or other donations made to the Temple. This will be starting in early September 2013 and is a trial run to gauge how effective this alternative method of funds receipt, other than cash or check, is utilized by the Sangha.

At this time, there is no additional fee to using a credit card. This may change at a later time when the Temple evaluates the full cost for acceptance of credit cards. As we begin this trial for credit card acceptance:

- 1) Credit cards must be swiped. We will not at this time accept credit cards over the phone or by e-mail authorization.
- 2) Credit cards will be accepted Monday Thursday during regular office hours and on Sundays from 10:00 AM 12:00 PM.
- 3) No paper receipt will be provided and will be listed on your credit card statement as "Seattle Buddhist Church". An electronic receipt can be e-mailed at the time of the transaction.
- 4) The Temple will have a signed paper form filled out by the individual which the Temple will use as a record to make the transaction. Donations will be included in your annual donation acknowledgement letter.
- 5) Accepted cards are Mastercard, Visa, American Express and Discover
- 6) The service will be provided through Flagship Merchant Services and is secure and encrypted to safeguard your credit card information.

There will only be 1 reader so your patience will be appreciated as transactions are made and as other questions/issues arise from trying out this new and alternative method for donations. A tentative start date for this will be September 8, 2013.

July 28 - Rinban Castro commented on the Pacific Buddhist Academy in Hawaii. David A. and family moved there so his daughter, a junior in high school, could attend. It has been a good experience for his daughter, and David has been handling their website for the last two years. Taiko is required in a student's freshman year; peace studies are part of the curriculum; and visual arts are strong. Every Friday students serve in the Hondo. The students and ministers work together on school events, i.e. a walk fundraiser for the PBA.

August 4 - Rev. Jim Warrick introduced Dr. Tsukasa Namekata (Clinical Associate Professor, Dept. of Health Services, UW and Director, Pacific Rim Disease Prevention Center). He discussed the victims of atomic radiation, and said in Dec 2009 scientists came to Seattle to coordinate seminars. Dr. Namekata said there was no problem with radiation in Fukushima. Miyo K. said people were picked up by station wagons and taken to a center. They were shunned by the populous. Dr. Namekata explained that the radiation from Three Mile Island and Chernobyl was low-level and not harmful to the population. He reported no increase in thyroid cancer. Miyo K. reported a relative went back to help and died three months later. Also she visited the Peace Park and never wants to go back. . .Tim W. of Columbus, OH, noted that in 1992 the City of Columbus celebrated the 500th anniversary of Columbus landing on the North American continent. A small group formed to note the negative actions and outcomes of the European invasion, and decided to include reminding everyone of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945. The group has continued this annual remembrance to this day.

August 11 - Rev. Jim Warrick reminded us to live in harmony with all things, and that eliminating suffering is paramount in Buddhism. Further, Buddhism offers insights if one is unhappy, and Sensei reminded us that with our minds we create the world. A participant said if you understand quantum physics you will understand Buddhism (the reverse applies as well). . . The front page of The Seattle Times of August 11 printed an article on genetically modified food (GMO). . . Sensei approved of the sangha being like-minded and able to discuss various aspects of life.

August 18 – After giving the English dharma talk at service, Irene Goto, MA recounted some events from her four-week Japan trip. She was so impressed with the courtesy of the people and indicated some important aspects of Japanese life -- including gratitude, bowing, gift-giving, and contributing money at shrines and temples. It was the first time she had ever seen fireflies, which are special in Japan. . . It was a special treat to see Laverne back at the temple 8-18. She felt it showed a lot of courage on Irene's part to talk about money in the hondo, a rather shunned subject. She felt donations are instrumental in keeping the temples alive and able to serve. She indicated the new people on the East Coast where she lives don't understand the necessity of donations. Apparently no one has told them because of the discomfort of talking about money. It was suggested to allow how you feel (kimochi) and what you can afford be your guide. Rev. Jim Warrick said no matter the size of the sangha, it is worthwhile to keep the Wheel of Dharma turning. . . Irene visited the Hongwanji where she attended Gotan-e services. She stayed in their hotel, where a jazz band played and a minister chanted the Shoshinge to the beat of the Junirai, a bit discordant at times. . . The food was good and she ate lots of fish, rice, sashimi, loquats (biwa), fava beans, and pickled ume (plums). . . Irene indicated many Japanese nationals are losing their ability to sit on the floor and prefer chairs. Also, Western toilets are prevalent. . . Irene will show pictures of her trip at a later date during Dharma Exchange.
