ANNOUNCING THE END OF BON ODORI

By Rinban Don Castro An article in the Seattle P.I. from July 12, 1908 (page 7) announced the end of Bon Odori:

The great annual Buddhist festival of Bon-O-bonodari, the All Saints' day of Japan, will be observed throughout the Mikado's domain commencing tomorrow and lasting until Wednesday night. This day corresponds with Memorial day in this country.

Local Japanese state that, as they are residents and citizens of this country, and many of them are Christians, they observe the American days, not the holidays of their native country and the feast days of the Buddhist religion. They decorated the graves of their dead on May 30 and so will not observe this festival.

As we prepare to observe our 83rd Bon Odori (or should I say Bon-O-bon-odari?) I wonder what happened. I guess someone forgot to tell the Buddhists that Bon Odori is cancelled. Maybe someone will quote me out of context and say, "Rev. Castro wrote '...Bon Odori is cancelled.""

I wonder who were the "Local Japanese" who were cited in this article. Later in the article, it is stated, "In the cities where the Western civilization and the Christian religion have penetrated, this custom is not nearly as widely observed as in the country." One can only surmise that no Buddhists were consulted in the writing of this article. I wonder what reaction there was to this article among our temple leaders back in 1908. Obviously, they did not go along with it. Certainly the fact that Buddhism has not only survived but thrived in the face of such discrimination should be part of the "festival of joy."

Another part of the article I find erroneous and misleading is the attempt to equate Obon and Memorial Day. According to Wikipedia (which I believe in this case is accurate), "Memorial Day is continued on page 2...


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Please join me in welcoming Rev. Miho Sekiya to the Seattle Betsuin. Rev. Sekiya will be assigned to our temple to share the Buddha Dharma alongside Rinban Castro, Rev. Jim Warwick, Sensei Irene Goto and our ministers' assistants.

Sekiya sensei has an impressive and unique background. Rev. Sekiya was born in Tokyo, Japan, where she received her early education. Her family then moved to Menlo Park and New York for her father's work during

her later childhood and adolescence. Rev. Sekiya received a Bachelor of Science degree in 1999 from Boston

University, after which time she



To pursue her growing interest in Buddhism, Sekiya sensei moved to Kyoto to study Jodo Shinshu Buddhism at Chuo Bukkyo Gakuin. She became a Kyoshi minister in 2013. Rev. Sekiya remained in Kyoto after her ministerial training to study Jodo Shinshu ritual, earning the special designation of Certified Tokubetsu Houmin (Special Rituals Minister).

Sekiya sensei comes highly recommended. Her deep knowledge of Buddhism, in general, and Jodo Shinshu in particular, her fluency in both English and Japanese, and her life experiences as a woman will complement our current ministerial staff's ability to share the Buddha Dharma. She will be just the second minister in the BCA with credentials as a Special Rituals Minister. As such, she will be a resource not just for us in the Pacific Northwest, but for the entire BCA. At the same time, she will learn first-hand about the fine work Rinban Castro, Rev. Warrick, Sensei Goto, and all our ministerial assistants

a federal holiday in the United States for remembering the people who died while serving in the country's armed forces." I believe if **all** deceased are honored on Memorial Day, it is contrary to the intent of the holiday which is to recognize and honor the sacrifices of those who died **while serving** in the armed forces.

Fortunately for Buddhists, we have Obon for honoring all our deceased loved ones. If I were to equate Obon with a Christian holiday I would choose All Souls Day on November and the associated observance of Halloween and we have seen how adulterated it has become. I wonder if Memorial Day has become a day to honor all deceased loved ones because the three day Christian holiday of All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day and All Souls Day (Oct. 31-Nov. 2) has lost its meaning.

15th World Buddhist Women's Convention: Over 2,000



women from the BCA, Canada, Hawaii, Japan, and South America, gathered together in Calgary, Alberta Canada, on May 30-31 for the 15th World Buddhist Women's Convention under the convention theme: "Embraced by the Oneness of Life." All were able to see the Gomonshusama, to hear stories from our Keynote Speakers, Rev. Nana Yanase from Japan, and Rev. Patricia Usuki from California. There were workshops, opportunities to meet women and men from different countries, and to share



experiences. Seventeen SBBWA members traveled to Calgary for this successful convention. It was wonderful to hear the chanting of the San Butsu Ge and Ju Sei Ge, in unison, by 2,000 voices. BUDDHIST BOOK STUDY In

this article a participant comments on the book, A River to Live By: The 12 Principles of Morita Therapy, by Dr. Brian Ogawa. On June 6 Rev. Kurt Rye talked about the book with 19 participants at Seattle Betsuin.

A River to Live By, Dr. Brian Ogawa, Xlibris/Random House, 2007.

This text "describes the twelve life principles of Morita therapy.".... "Originating in traditional Eastern philosophy and modern Japanese psychiatry . . . "



Rev. Kurt Rye, Ekoji Buddhist Temple, counselor and minister, treated book study members to his extensive, colorful and poignant teaching and experiences as they relate to Morita Therapy.

One principle addressed is emotions. We are emotional but we are to think of being "emotion ALL", that is, to embrace every emotion but to not secondarily judge emotions

as "good" or "bad". We are able to then let them go and move on.

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← By extension, a participant asked how this might work with a death. Rev. Ryes's answer was that death is the ultimate separation. It is healthy to grieve. It is hoped that one eventually understands that the decedent is finally gone, and, when "we no longer have 'what ifs'", we have closure.

My favorite Zen saying from Ogawa's text is, "When you walk, walk. When you sit, sit. Don't wobble."

Rev. Castro reports that a seminar with Rev. Dr.
Toshikazu Arai is being planned between Saturday,
August 1, through Wednesday, August 5. There will likely
be several meetings with members both in Japanese and
English. His English is excellent! He has lectured here
before on the Tannisho and has published the translation
and commentary on it.

Sept. 5 is scheduled for Book Study but no topic has been set yet.

requirements for the Wohelo Award demonstrates leadership, organizational skills, respect for others and a

desire and ability to make a difference in the world. This is a special achievement as it has been 23 years since a temple member has received a Wohelo award.

Over the past 4 years, both girls completed the full high school Horizon



curriculum, and in addition, each girl created, developed and completed 3 advocacy projects.

For 2 years, Samantha H. coordinated the holiday decorating and entertainment at Wisteria View Manor. She also planned, organized and led the "2015 Dad-Kid Weekend" held at Camp Sealth. Dad-Kid Weekend is by far our Camp Fire council's largest event and drew nearly 150 participants.

Kayla B. focused on promoting mathematics among youth and bringing entertainment to the elderly. She led her high school math team for 2 years and separately, worked with younger girls to make math fun. For her entertainment advocacy, Kayla scheduled and planned several shows, recruiting musicians and dancers to perform together with her at senior homes.

In addition, the girls worked together to form and co-lead a new Camp Fire group at our temple. There were no new Kindergarten groups, so Kayla and Samantha created a new group in order to keep Camp Fire going strong at our temple.
