

## "Myokonin Shoma"

In the long history of Jodo Shinshu, there were some people who really understood and appreciated Amida

Buddha's teaching. These people are called "MYO KO NIN (rare-wonderful-person)". There was a MYO KO NIN whose name was Shoma. He was born around the year of 1800 and passed away in 1872. He was not a scholarly person. He was a person who ardently and honestly listened to Buddha's teaching. Because of his honest and conscientious character, many people visited him to ask him about their problems or question him about the Jodo Shinshu teaching. Let me introduce two of Shoma's stories.

"Shoma and a young female minister" There was a young female Buddhist minister who had some questions about the Jodo Shinshu teaching. She visited a temple and conveyed her understanding and appreciation of the Buddha Dharma to the head minister of this temple. And she asked the head minister,

"Is my understanding correct? Am I able to be born into the Amida Buddha's Pure Land?"

The head minister of this temple replied,

"Yes, you are right."

She was so happy to hear that and went home.

After a few days, she was worried about her understanding of Buddha's teaching, again. She visited another temple, and conveyed her understanding and appreciation of Buddha's teaching and asked the head minister of that temple,

"Is my understanding correct? Am I able to be born into the Amida Buddha's Pure Land?"

The head minister of that temple answered,

"No, you are wrong."

She told each minister the same thing but one said

she was right the other said she was wrong. She was confused and didn't know what she should do. At that time, her friend recommended that she visit Shoma to get his guidance. She asked him,

"Shoma. Which minister should I believe?"

Which minister's answer is right?"

Shoma replied,

"You should not be confused with these ministers' answers because these ministers do not own the Pure Land. I just listen to the Amida Buddha because Amida Buddha created the Pure Land and tells me that my birth in the Pure Land is settled."

"Shoma and his friend" Shoma's friends got seriously ill. A doctor gave up trying to cure his illness. This friend was also a Jodo

Shinshu follower, and he used to listen to Dharma Talks and take Buddhist study classes. But when he encountered his death, he totally forgot about Amida Buddha's teaching. He was constantly complaining to his family.


"I don't want to die. Where am I going after

I die? I am not ready yet."

He was confused and distracted a lot. Because the family did not know what they could do for him, they decided to ask Shoma to visit him. The family expected Shoma to give him some venerable words to get relief and become settled.

Shoma arrived at his friend's home. He passed through his friend's bedroom and walked straight to their family Buddhist altar, OBUTSUDAN, and sat down there. Shoma opened the altar and started chanting Sutra and expressed his appreciation to Amida Buddha. The family was utterly at a loss for words because of his unexpected behavior. The family told Shoma.

"Shoma, we don't need you to chant a sutra today. We asked you to talk to him about the afterlife. Please go to his bedside and let him get relief." continued...

Shoma replied,

"What are you saying? I didn't make the primal vow. I have no power to save him. I don't have anything to tell him. Amida Buddha made the primal vow 'if he and I should not be born into the Amida Buddha's Pure Land, may Amida Buddha not attain the perfect enlightenment.' Amida Buddha had already attained the perfect enlightenment. This Amida Buddha is here now with us. Do you think this is not enough? Do you think we have to do something else to be born into the Amida Buddha's Pure Land?"

Shoma's friend who was dying heard Shoma's words, and he said,

"That is true. I forgot the Amida Buddha's teaching and worried about my afterlife. Amida Buddha made the primal vow for me to be born there. Amida Buddha is always with me. I don't have to worry anything about my afterlife even though I am an imperfect person."

He recited NAMOAMIDABUTSU and became secure.

These two Shoma stories tell us what a Jodo Shinshu follower should be. Shoma's answer is simple and strikes to the heart of Amida Buddha's teaching. We just rely on Amida Buddha and listen to the Amida Buddha's guidance without any calculations. Then we just recite NAMOAMIDABUTSU with gratitude. Gassho,

Not only do we observe and recognize those who helped found the Betsuin, the Eitaikyo Muen Hoyo service also recognizes all who have come before us, known and unknown.

I would like to take a moment to express my gratitude to everyone who has supported the temple over the last 123 years, and especially who have helped us to recover and rebuild from the arson attack at the beginning of the year. I'm happy to report that we have begun holding services in the temple gym, allowing more Sangha members to attend in person. Reconstruction of the Hondo, offices, and Memorial Hall Chapel is set to begin this month. It is through the tireless work of so many that the Sangha continues even through these difficult times.

I hope you will be able to join us for a service soon.
