"Toro <u>nagashi</u>" - floating lanterns on the water

oro nagashi is a special attraction of summer in Japan. Each region has its unique way of conducting Toro nagashi. My hometown, Nagasaki, has a tradition of "Shoro nagashi". Shoro literally means the spirit of a dead person. People make a Shoro boat and hang lanterns on it. Sizes of Shoro boats are all different. Family members, relatives and neighbors get together and carry their boats to the ocean. On the way to the ocean, people set off fireworks and firecrackers. It is such a lively event. When I was a child I was so excited and looked forward to Shoro nagashi every year.

As an adult, my view of *Shoro nagashi* has gradually changed. Making and carrying the *Shoro* boat means that the family lost one or more of its members. People participate in the *Shoro nagashi* because they lost a family member or close friend in the past year. They experienced a sad event, parting from someone they love before the annual lively event.

They may have their regrets

that their loved one passed away so soon. They may also wish that their loved one rests in peace. It might be difficult for some people to find words to express their feelings. People put their honest thoughts into *Toro nagashi* and *Shoro nagashi* and float them on the water.

Toro nagashi was brought to U.S. and has been conducted in various cities. In Seattle there is a peace gathering, "From Hiroshima To Hope", which is held on August 6th. The event honors victims of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and all victims of violence. People wish to eliminate nuclear weapons and for everyone to live in peace. People light lanterns and float them onto Green Lake.

Through practicing *Toro nagashi*, people send their thoughts to their loved one and, also listen to their loved ones' voices. I would like to introduce a member of Kogenji, my family's temple. His name is Mr. Katsuji Yoshida. He was thirteen years old when the A-Bomb was dropped. He was badly burned, including his face. After the War he suffered from his burns and the cold stares of those

around him. He conveyed his experiences of surviving the A-Bomb and his wish for peace until his life ended at the age of 78. He also visited the U.S. to tell his story and his wish. I would like to introduce you one of his voices.

"The basis for peace is for people to understand the pain of others." Mr. Yoshida always tells people this word. When I participate in "From Hiroshima To Hope" this year, with keeping in mind his word, I would like to conduct the *Toro nagashi*. While lighting my lantern, I light a torch of peace in my heart. While floating my lantern, I wish that the torch of peace is transmitted to the next person and gradually spread all over the world.

In this world there are so many problems we need to grapple with. There are many issues to be solved for everyone to live at ease. Some people feel pain from various discrimination. Due to climate

change, some people are threatened to lose their place to live. Some animals and plants are also faced with danger to their lives. There are many things to do to solve all these issues. Each of us needs to seriously contemplate what we can do. Whatever we do, we need to keep one thing in our heart. It is to listen and understand the pain of others which Mr. Yoshida taught. In Buddhism, the heart to understand the pain of others is called Jihi. "compassion". There are some people around you who are suffering from their pain. You may be a person who is suffering from your pain. We listen and understand each others' pain. It is the path for everyone to live at ease. To make this world peaceful, each of us needs to learn and practice Jihi, "compassion". I appreciate that *Toro Nagashi* is one precious opportunity to learn Jihi, "compassion". What wish do you put into your lantern? Please contemplate Jihi, "compassion" through Toro Nagashi.

Katsumi "Kats" Tanino passed away peacefully on July 6, 2021, at 92 years of age. He was born on October 5, 1928, in Seattle, Washington to Mitsumasa and Shizue Tanino. Kats spent his formative years growing up in Bellevue. Washington working and playing on the family farm with his two brothers Ryomi (Ry) and Matami (Tom) and two sisters Takae (Tak) and Tsukiyo (Tsuk).

With the signing of Executive Order 9066, the Taniyou didn't get an opportunity to watch the premier, no no family (except Ry who was at WSU and later joined the 442nd army unit) was evacuated to Pinedale Assembly Center near Fresno, California, and was later sent to Tule Lake Relocation Camp in 1942. After WWII, Kats moved to Spokane and completed his high school education and attended Gonzaga University, earning a Mechanical engineering degree in 1951. He worked for Metcalf & Harstad Associates, an engineering firm, from 1951-1980. Known as a talented and reputable engineer, Kats and Jon Stack opened their own firm, ST Engineering, Inc. in 1980, where Kats was president until he retired in 1993.

> Kats met Teruyo "Terrie" Arakawa, from Fresno, California, while in the Tule Lake Relocation camp, and married her in 1953. They moved to Seattle and shared 66 very full and loving years until Terrie's passing in 2020. Together they enjoyed traveling all around the world and playing bridge, as members of the Magnolia Senior Bridge Group.

As a life-long, avid fisherman Kats fished all over the state of Washington. He especially enjoyed his salmon fishing trips to the Washington Coast where he caught many trophy-size King salmon.

Both Kats and Terrie were very active in the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple. Kats held many positions within the church, including President (1986-1987). He also held positions with the Northwest District Buddhist Churches of America, the Buddhist Churches of America, Wisteria View Housing Corporation, and the Kawabe Memorial Committee.

In 2017 Kats and Terrie moved to The Lakeshore retirement community. Even then, Kats still enjoyed playing cards and started a weekly poker game with other residents. He also amused himself by playing blackjack at nearby casinos, winning more than he lost. After Terrie's passing, Kats' remaining sibling, sister Tak, moved from California to The Lakeshore, and was able to spend his final days with him.

Katsumi Tanino led a respectable and generous life. As he rejoins the love of his life, Terrie, he also leaves behind his sister Takae Walts, and many nieces, nephews, and friends, who will miss him greatly.

A memorial service for Kats and Terrie will be scheduled for a later date. Remembrances may be sent to the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple. •••

"We express our joy to be able to encounter Namoamidabutsu and the guidance of Pure Land through chanting the Sutras."

In Jodo Shinshu, THE THREE PURE LAND SUTRAS delivered by Shakyamuni Buddha are the scriptures which we rely on as our doctrinal basis. English translations of THE THREE PURE LAND SUTRAS have been available; and now the <u>comuniced liturgical material</u> has been published, making it possible for non-Japanese speaking audiences to chant the Sutras in their entirety.

In the Pure Land Way, Moster Shan-too (613-681) explained the five right practices for attaining birth in the Pure Land. They are: (1) chanting the sutras, (2) meditating on Amida Buddha and his land, (3) worshiping Amida Buddha, (4) reciting the nembutsu, and (5) praising and making offerings to Amida. These practices are the religious actions recommended for nembutsu followers to carry out in their daily lives.

Rennyo Shōnin is revered for his great achievement as the "Second Founder" in the eight hundred year history of the Hongwanji.

When he became a spiritual head of the Hongwanji, Japan was developing economically, and a new social structure was forming during the Warring period. It was a period of internal warfare and people were facing social turmoil.

Rennyo transmitted, in an easily understood manner, the path of being spiritually liberated according to Amida Buddha's deep wish, and the nembutsu taught by the Founder Shinran Shonin.

Because of Rennyo's energetic propagation carried on through his life, the teaching of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism spread throughout the country and became the foundation for the Hongwanji today.

In this seminar, we will learn about the life of Rennyo and his propagation methods, which may provide some hints to the American Shinshū community today.



Rev. Dr. Mutsumi Wondra serves as a BCA minister at the Orange County Buddhist Church and adjunct professor at the IBS. She received Tokudo (2006) and Kyoshi (2007) ordination from Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha. She earned an MA from the Institute of Buddhist Studies; and MA and PhD from Ryukoku University Graduate School of Shin Buddhist Studies; and Hongwanjiha Hokyo.

After using the BCA recordings organized by the late Rae Imamura for Obon, Obon, It's Festival Day and Obon no Uta for the Obon/Hatsubon service on July 11, we featured Season of Obon for the service on July 25. Yumi Hojo recalls that when she wrote Obon. Obon, It's Festival Day there were only a few gathas written in English for temple service use.
