## Jodo Shinshu Ritual in Daily Life and how to serve the home altar

#### Gassho – joined palms

Join both palms together and place the *nenju* over your hands with the thumbs lightly resting on the beads. The fingers are aligned and straight. The joined hands are at mid-chest level at a 45 degree angle from the upper body. The elbows rest downward, naturally, not akimbo. Recite the *nembutsu* while maintaining this posture.

#### *Raihai* – bow

Keep your upper body straight and bow from the waist to a 45 degree angle with the hands together in gassho, then return to the original upright position. Finally, release the hands from  $gassh\bar{o}$ .

#### **Burning Incense** – Oshoko

There are several different ways of making offerings to the Buddha. "burning incense -oshoko-" is one of them.

Burning incense, *oshoko*, is the ritual/etiquette to burn incense; gassho and raihai express our respect and gratitude to Amida Buddha.

First, place a lit charcoal in the *kanagoro*/metal incense burner; then burn the granular form of fragrant, dark resinous wood, such as jinko (agarwood) or goshuko (a blend of five kinds of fragrant wood) before the image of the Buddha.

#### How to "oshoko" (burn incense)

- 1. Stop about one step before the *kanagoro*/metal incense burner and do a shallow bow; step forward with your left foot.
- 2. Using your right hand, remove the lid of the granular incense container and rest it on the right side of the container's rim.
- 3. Take a pinch of incense and place it in the incense burner.
- 4. Replace the lid on the incense container.
- 5. Gassho (join the palms), recite, "Namoamidabutsu" and perform raihai (bow).
- 6. Step back, beginning with the right foot. Align the feet, do a shallow bow, then leave.

## Burning and offering of incense/Guko

- $Guk\bar{o}$  is the burning of incense as an offering to the Buddha which originated from India.
- Nenko is the burning of makko (powdered incense) in the incense burner, regardless of whether there is a service or not.

#### ...the home altar ... continued from p. 1

• Senkō (stick incense) can be used in place of makkō. Break the stick incense into an appropriate length, light it, and lay it inside the incense burner. There is no specific rule as to how many sticks to offer.

<u>Offering of Candle</u> There are two kinds of candles used depending upon the occasions when they are used.

 (1) hakurō (white candle) — regular services
(2) shurō (red candle) — Hō 'onkō, kyōsan hōyō, nenki hōyō (Buddhist anniversary memorial service), 7th year memorial and subsequent memorials

- Candles in the home altar (*obutsudan*) are also lit for daily morning and evening service.
- Normally, place a *mokurō* (a lacquered, wooden red candle) on the candleholder when a candle is not lit.

#### **Offering of flowers**

- Replace the seasonal flowers and greenery before they wither and change or add fresh water frequently.
- Do not use flowers that have thorns or are poisonous, and do not use artificial flowers.
- Do not use red flowers for funeral and memorial service.

# Offering of Candle, Incense, and Flowers Offering candle, incense, and flowers are the basis of adorn-

candle, incense, and flowers are the basis of adornment in front of the Buddha.

- **Candle**: The candlelight illuminates the dark which represents Buddha's Great Wisdom.
- Incense: The fragrance of incense spreads without boundary and represents Buddha's Great Compassion
- Flowers: A flower blooms when the conditions for blooming are right. (Interdependence). A flower also withers one day. (Impermanence). A flower represents my life which is embraced by Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion.

#### Offering of Rice (buppan)

- Normally, offer the *buppan* (Offering of Rice) for morning service and remove it before noon.
- We gratefully receive the *buppan* to eat.
- Offer the *buppan* in the afternoon, if you are not able to offer it in the morning.
- It is most important to make rice offering with gratitude.

<u>Offering of Food</u> This is the way we place the Buddha in the center of our life.

- Food is placed in the altar for special services, (such as Hoonko, etc), and funeral and memorial services.
- From the center, outward, the food is arranged on both sides in the following order: *mochi* (rice cake), sweets, and fruit as diagramed below:



- Fish and meat should not be offered.
- When we receive something from someone, we offer it to the Buddha first; then we receive it with gratitude.

#### **Cleaning the Altar**

- Clean the altar frequently.
- Dust the home altar with a feather duster.
- Add fresh water to flower vases.
- Wipe the altar adornments.
- Smooth the surface of the burnt incense in the burner.
- Do not touch and wipe surfaces covered with gold leaf which is delicate.
- Designate and devote cleaning equipment (such as cleaning cloth, feather dusters, hand brooms) for altar use only.

Do you recall some years back that we included Climb Ev'ry Mountain from the musical "The Sound of Music" in our Earth Day Music Service? We have been so fortunate to have had such an array of singers and instrumentalists support service music at Seattle Betsuin over many years. We also had relatively more freedom before presenting online services to use some selections of music or lyrics which are more restricted for online streaming. With the transition back to in-person services, not just having people in the hondo chanting and singing and listening to the Dharma, but also hearing the sounds of the bonsho and the kansho ringing again also seems to touch the soul. However, in many ways at Seattle Betsuin as well as across BCA, we still rely on online formats.
