Dialogue between Rev. Naoya Kusunoki and Mr. Takayasu Ichihara
(Interviewer)

Topic: *The Motherly Ghost – the mother purchased candies although a bad thing may happen to her*

K = Rev. Naoya Kusunoki (head minister of Kogenji Temple in Nagasaki, Japan), I = Mr. Takayasu Ichihara

I: Please tell me today’s topic!

K: It is “*yurei* (Ghost)”. For some reason, most ghosts in Japan are female figures, aren’t they!

I: I agree. They have long hair and hang their hands in front.

K: Yes. And, the ghosts have no legs and they float in mid air!

These are the distinguishing features of ghosts in Japan. These features are related to Buddhism. Long hair represents people that left behind a lot of past attachments with great reluctance. Their hands hanging in front represent always trying to grasp their bright future, but they never fulfill it.

I: I see. The ghosts are attached to their past, and also can not move forward.

K: And, they are floating and roaming around. It represents that they are not settled in this present time.

I: We call someone who is attached to their past, cannot move forward, and are not settled here and now, a ghost.

K: Yes, you got it.

I: When I think about the features of a ghost, I feel I am just like a ghost.

K: You are right. Everyone could be ghost! (laughter)

I: OK. Then, there may be many ghosts in this world.

K: The features of ghosts tell us that we should walk the steady path in our daily life.

I: It is a good example of how we should not act, isn’t it?

K: Yes, so a ghost story has been told at this temple, Kogenji temple.

I: It is “The Motherly Ghost (*Ugume no Yurei*)” which is a very famous story in Nagasaki. *Ugume* means a pregnant woman, doesn’t it! This temple opens the statue to the public annually.

K: Yes, we have the annual exhibit on August 16th. The story is originally from Gandhara in India/Pakistan. They also have a statue

a baby being born in a grave.

I: Wow! It is originally from Gandhara.

K: Yes, the story originated from Shakyamuni Buddha's story. The story has been passed down from India, China, and Japan. Then, eventually, it was passed to this temple in Nagasaki.

I: Can I ask you to tell us about the story, "The Motherly Ghost".

K: Long, long time ago, there was a candy shop in a small town called "Kojiya-machi" in Nagasaki city.

I: Is there still "Kojiya-machi" in Nagasaki?

K: Yes. It is just about five minutes' walk from here.

I: Oh. Then, people in Nagasaki can describe about where it is. We can hear this story more realistically.

K: It was just about time to close the candy shop; the candy shop owner heard someone knock on the door. He opened the door, and a woman was standing there. She had a coin in her hand and said, "I would like to buy one-mon (old Japanese currency) worth of candy, please." The owner reluctantly put the candies into the bag and gave it to her.

I: She came with just holding one-mon coin.

K: She came to the candy shop everyday around the same time when the store was about to close. On the seventh night, the woman came to the store again, but she looked very sad. She said she did not have any money. The owner thought that she had a serious reason to buy candies everyday and gave her one-mon worth of candy. She thanked him and went into the darkness. The owner, seeing her behavior, worried, and trailed her. She walked and came to this *Kogenji* temple. She went behind the *Hondo* (main hall) and disappeared into a grave. He shuddered. He went to the temple to tell the resident minister what he saw. The next morning, the minister and the candy shop owner went to the grave again. They put their hands together first and then tilled the grave with a hoe; at that time, "Mewl, mewl....." What a surprise it was!

A newborn baby was curled up on the belly of the mother who was dead. The baby was eating the candy.

I: Was the baby alive?

K: Yes, the baby was alive in the grave.
