"White Path—4 or 5 inches wide"

There was a traveler journeying in a wasteland where there was no one to be seen. From behind, bands of brigands started chasing him. The brigands called him, "Hey, traveler, come to join us!" Further, wild beasts appeared and tried to catch him. When he looked forward, along the way, he came upon two rivers. One was a river of fire extending southward. It was raging flames. Another was a river of water extending north. It was a raging stream. Each river is immeasurably deep and endless to the north and south. There is no way to find a detour. There was a white path between the river of fire and the river of water. The width was only four or five inches. The path continued from the eastern bank, where he is now, to the western bank. But the water waves surged over the path and flames sweep up to burning the path without break. It seemed that it was impossible to walk the white path. If the traveler walks forward on the white path, he falls into the rivers and die. If he walks backward, he is caught by the brigands and wild beasts and dies. If he stays there, he also dies. There was no way for him to escape death. He was in a desperate situation. At the time, behind him on the eastern bank, he heard a voice, "Walk this path straight. You can escape from the desperate situation." Furthermore, he heard a voice from the western bank from the other shore of the path, "Do not worry. You can walk this path, just come across the path and come to this shore." The traveler simply followed the voices, "Just walk and go to the other shore" and "Just walk and come to this shore" and proceeded to walk the white path. The river of fire and the river of water were still raging. But the trav-

eler was never burned and swept away. He was able to walk across the path and got to the other shore.

This is a famous parable, "Two Rivers and A White Path". The traveler is representing a seeker, and human beings. The river of fire expresses human's anger and hatred. The river of water expresses human's greed and attachments. The brigands and wild animals represent all kinds of obstacles which interrupt humans to seek truth. The voice, "Just walk and go to the other shore," from the eastern bank is the guidance of Sakyamuni Buddha. The voice, "Just walk and come to this shore," from the western bank is the guidance of Amida Buddha. The white path is the nembutsu path which Amida Buddha shows us. This parable tells all us nembutsu followers who entrust ourselves in Amida Buddha's wisdom and compassion that we can cross over to Amida Buddha's Pure land without fail and attain enlightenment although we nembutsu followers still have our anger, hatred, greed, and attachments

(bonno煩悩).

When I hear this parable, I have to put myself in the place of the traveler. The meaning of death in this parable is that human beings cannot be liberated from the circle of birth and death and remain residing in the six realms. One question came up in my mind. Why is the white path which Amida Buddha and Sakyamuni Buddha both encouraged to walk so narrow? Four or five inches is almost the width of my palm. And there are rivers of fire and of water on each side. It is as if I am walking a tightrope in a circus show. People who have a high level of physical ability may be able to walk such a path. Otherwise, it is impossible to do it. Is it necessary to have special skills or ability to walk the white path? I do not think so. This white path must be very wide and flat for anyone to easily walk without any danger. Our anger, hatred, greed, and attachments make us see the path as narrow and difficult. From the Buddha's point of view, it is a vast and reliable path. So, Buddha constantly guides us to walk the white path. We human beings make ourselves believe that it is a narrow, difficult, non-reliable, and useless path. How can we remove our preconceived ideas? The answer is to listen to the Buddha Dharma. We carefully listen to the Buddha's wish (vow), and Buddha's heart and reflect upon ourselves. Please put yourself in the traveler's place in the parable and listen to it. The story becomes more meaningful to you.



GATHAS

Temple services also include gathas (songs). Lyrics may contain poems/verses from Buddhist texts or be based on Buddhist themes. Composition styles range from traditional hymnal music to more contemporary sounds, and reflect the contributions of many Shin Buddhist musicians, ministers, and members. Gathas are sung together as a sangha, sometimes featuring an accompanist and group of singers or choir.

Perhaps the most notable gathas originating from Japan are Ondokusan I, Ondokusan II, and Shinshu Shuka. Both versions of Ondokusan are based on a poem (wasan) written by Shinran Shonin to express deep gratitude for the compassion of the Buddha and all of our dharma teachers. Shinshu Shuka (Anthem) debuted in 1923 in honor of the 700th Anniversary of the Jodo Shinshu teaching's establishment

When the BCA Shin Buddhist Service Book was published in 1994, the Gatha Committee also created companion audio recordings for most of its songs and music, coordinated by the late Rae Imamura. The first three gathas below were recorded by the late opera vocalist Mika Shigematsu with piano accompaniment by Rae Imamura. Sensei enjoyed a deep appreciation for art and shared his own expressions in painted works. We are very honored to include two of his paintings. One is an early portrait of himself. It may reveal a likeness of himself before his days as a minister. The second is a portrait of Shinran Shonin. This reflects a deep and personal impression left upon Rev. Watanabe as he endeavored to share the Nembutsu teachings of Master Shinran with all of us.



Sensei served the Oxnard Buddhist Temple and the Buddhist Church of Santa Barbara during his tenure with the Buddhist Churches of America. He was 49 years old. Thank you, Sensei. This work by Watanabe Sensei is a print of a self-portrait painted earlier in his life.
