In view of the Russian invasion of Ukraine that began in February 2022, as Nembutsu followers who have deeply inscribed in our hearts and minds Shinran Shonin's message of "May there be peace in the world," we firmly stand against the military infringement of the other nation's sovereignty, and also aspire for immediate return of peace in Ukraine.

Over the last year, COVID-19 continues to be a global pandemic. I would like to offer my deepest condolences to those who fell victim to the disease and express my sympathies to those who are undergoing treatment. I would also like to express my respect and sincere gratitude to the



doctors, nurses, and other frontline medical professionals who have been engaging in the treatment of infected people, as well as all essential workers who have made it possible for us to continue with our lives.

The pandemic has forced us to learn firsthand that we will continue to be confronted by unexpected situations even in modern times despite technologies both in science and medical fields being highly developed. Sakyamuni Buddha, who passed on the Dharma to us, made clear that there is no life nor entity in this world that lasts forever. This truth, the principle of impermanence, has never changed even in this time and age approximately 2500 years since his time. Another fact that does not change is our inability to accept this truth as it is, and because of this, we continue struggling.

This is the very reason why, regardless of the pandemic, we can rely on the Jodo Shinshu teaching clarified by Shinran Shonin, which guides us as a spiritual foundation that enables us to move forward even when being overwhelmed with difficulties. A gathering at the temple with Amida Buddha as its center provides a great opportunity to receive the Dharma as well as an occasion in which people can support and reassure one another as fellow practicers who follow the same teaching.

I hope you will continue to share the teaching within the greater society through various ways and your temple will or continue to serve as a place where people can gather and find comfort in its activities. I humbly ask for your understanding and cooperation in support of your temples. I would like to conclude my new year's greeting with my heartfelt appreciation to you all.

The Season of *Dana*: Beyond the Temple and Into the Community Submitted by Ann Oxrieder

"Set your heart on doing good, Do it over and over again, And you will be filled with joy."

While we know that SBBWA, Dharma School and different youth groups practice dana within the temple, sometimes we're not aware of their generosity toward the organizations in the community around us. In this season of giving, let's thank these groups for their acts of dana in past years and their inspiration to continue these in 2023.

In 2021 SBBWA, with the aid of Dharma School families, delivered 200 new men's socks to

our neighbor, Operation Nightwatch, for its annual campaign: Sock it to the Homeless.

For years, temple organizations have been involved in food drives for students at the Bailey Gatzert Elementary School. Choosing this school was an easy decision based not only on its proximity to the temple, but its family de-

mographics: 78% low income and 16% homeless.

In '20-21, Junior YBA sponsored the school food drive, and is collecting food now to be delivered in 2023 This year, Jr. YBA conducted a sock and toiletries drive for the BENU community home, a shelter for single adult males, and Operation Nightwatch. In years preceding the pandemic, Dharma School paid for, prepared and served a monthly meal for youth at the Orion Youth Center, while Jr. YBA held a mask and toiletries drive for the organization and made donations of enough food to fill two SUV's.

In 2020-21, Ron Hamakawa, citing Mokuren's visit to his mother in the realm of Hungry Ghosts, said, "This parable is meant to teach us vital lessons of...selfless giving." To match deeds to words, the Bon Odori Committee donated \$5,000 to the Asian Counseling and Referral Food Bank. Sangha members added donations leading to a total of more than \$16,000.

Camp Fire has brought holiday cheer to residents of Wisteria View Manor, for more than twenty years. Girls decorate the common areas and hang wreaths on each of the resident's

door. They also pass out small gifts, serve refreshments and sing Christmas carols.

SBBWA's contributions to the community are not limited to socks. The group makes three financial donations a year to different non-profits in the area that have included Keiro Northwest, Mary's Place, Northwest Harvest, Children's Hospital, ACRS, Neighborhood House, and International Community Health Services.

And there's more.

The Betsuin has provided free use of its gymnasium to Wisteria View Housing's pop-up COVID vaccination clinics which began in February 2021 and have been repeated ten times. Temple volunteers conduct telephone outreach, schedule appointments and staff the day of the event. Wisteria View Housing planned, coordinated and sponsored the clinics in partnership with International Community Health Services and conducts outreach to serve seven other temples/churches, three other low income and/or senior housing projects and two social services providers located in the neighborhood around the temple and Wisteria View Manor.

It's safe to say that those who worked on these projects were filled with satisfaction if not joy.
