# "The Anniversary of the Establishment of Jodo Shinshu Teaching"

This year of 2023 is the year of the 850<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our founder, Shinran Shonin's Birth. Also, next year, 2024, is the year for the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu teaching. At our mother temple, Hongwanji in Kyoto Japan, the joint services to celebrate these two anniversaries are held from March to May this year. It is included in the Seattle Betsuin Japan Tour itinerary to join the celebration service. On this opportunity, I would like to introduce the establishment of Jodo Shinshu teaching.

Jodo Shinshu is the name of our sect of Buddhism. It is translated as "The True Essence of Pure Land Buddhist Teaching". We also call it "Shin Buddhism", or "True Pure Land Buddhism". It is said that Shinran Shonin completed a draft of his magnum opus "The True Teaching, Practice, and Realization of the Pure Land Way" (*Kyo Gyo Shin Sho*) in 1224 (*gennin* 1). Seven hundred years following the completion of the composition, a celebratory service was observed for seven days beginning on April 15, 1923, marking the anniversary of the establishment of the Jodo Shinshu teaching. Later, other Shinshū sects which follow Shinran Shonin's teaching collaborated in adopting this service, and April 15 was designated as the date of establishment of Jōdo Shinshū.

Shinran Shonin left Mt. Hiei at the age of 29 after he practiced and studied Buddhism there for twenty years. Then, he visited Master Honen, encountered the Amida Buddha's teaching, and started walking the path of Nembutsu. But a tragedy happened when he was at the age of 35. A group of Buddhist monks sub-

mitted a nine-article resolution to the Emperor, petitioning that the Nembutsu teaching be prohibited. Then he was exiled to Echigo (current Niigata prefecture). Five years later, he was pardoned. He moved to the Kanto area (current Tokyo area) at the age of 42. He devotedly spread the Nembutsu teaching in Echigo and Kanto area.

In 1224, the Nembutsu teach-

ing was prohibited again when he was at the age of 52. He entered Mt. Hiei at the age of nine, since then, he practiced and studied Buddhism very hard. Although he could not find his path at Mt. Hiei, he eventually encountered the Nembutsu path. It is the guidance for all beings. It is the path of abandoning various practices, entrusting Amida Buddha's Vow power, and reciting Nembutsu (Namo Amidabutsu, I take refuge in Amida Buddha). Everyone who walks this path, without exception, are born into Amida Buddha's Pure Land and attains enlightenment. Shinran Shonin truly appreciated the path and he realized that it was the only path he could follow. It was not acceptable that the teaching was prohibited. He must have been frustrated and concerned that the path was closed. He needed to reveal that the path was not a heretical path. It is the path which tells the heart of Sakyamuni Buddha and follows various Indian, Chinese, and Japanese Buddhist masters' interpretations of Buddha Dharma. He had such a strong will and wrote "The True Teaching, Practice, and Realization of the Pure Land Way" (Kyo Gyo Shin Sho).

The Nembustu followers are able to walk this path without having doubt because Shinran Shonin revealed that it is the right path to the Pure Land and to attain enlightenment. There is no clear record when he started writing and completed it. But it

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...**Anniversary** continued from p. 1... is for sure that these two persecutions of the Nembutsu became one of the main causes to write his magnum opus. Shinran Shonin wrote in the hymns of the Pure Land Masters, (Koso Wasan).

Our teacher Genku (Honen) appeared Through the power of the Light of Wisdom, And revealing the true Pure Land way (Jodo

Shin shu 净土真宗), He taught the selected Primal Vow. (CWS P. 387)

"Jodo 浄土" means "Pure Land". "Shin 真" means

"true or essence". "Shu 宗 means "teaching / school". Master Honen established his school / teaching of the selected Primal Vow of Amida Buddha and named it

"Jodo shu (浄土宗 Pure Land School)" Master Honen did not call it "Jodo Shin shu". Shinran Shonin used "Jodo Shin shu" in this hymn to tell that it is the true teaching of the Pure Land Way which Master Honen revealed. He did not have any intention of establishing a new Buddhist school. As a result of writing "The True Teaching, Practice, and Realization of the Pure Land Way" (Kyo Gyo Shin Sho), it became a great achievement to reveal the heart of Master Honen's teaching and deepen the Nembutsu path. Later, those who follow Shinran Shonin's teaching, respected Shinran Shonin as founder of Jodo Shinshu school. And now, we are listening to the teaching.

He then appreciated and embraced his own unique qualities. The children learned that they are each special and to accept themselves just as they are. They made a picture of a spoon carrying an onenju to remind them of acceptance. After reviewing the events in the life of Siddhartha Gautama, the students colored pictures of those events. They cut and glued the pictures in order on a circle to make a spinning wheel of the life of the Buddha. The students made a "Lotus" card using different Buddhist symbols and items that can be found around the temple. After they were done making the cards they played "Lotus" for prizes. For Valentine's Day the students listened to a story about February and her best friends January and March. Valentine's Day was February's favorite holiday, and she spent many days making Valentine's cards for her friends. The students then made Valentine Day's cards for the special person in their life.

For the month of February, **the 4**<sup>th</sup>/**5**<sup>th</sup> **grade** class focused on Metta and Dana. We read a few short books and brainstormed ways we could spread Dana every day. We wrote positive messages, unsigned, and tucked them into places where we knew they would be found and also random places where we weren't sure who and when someone would find them. We also decorated sanitizer bottles which read, "Spread the Dharma...Not Germs" to give to our friends or family. We had fun during Gym Day and are excited to celebrate the New Year with the sangha.



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#### 2023 Taitetsu Unno Memorial Lecture



The 2023 Taitetsu Unno Memorial Lecture will be held in person at the Jodo Shinshu Center on Friday March 31, as well as virtually

Dr Ruben Habito will deliver a talk entitled "Beyond Transcendence Back to Earth: A Challenge to Religions in our Time of Global Crisis.

Our global community today is in a critical moment of our history, with impending ecological destruction, violent conflicts between sectors of our human family that needlessly destroy many lives, a yawning gap between the multitudes of those living in poverty and the very few who are able to live in luxury. There is also an increasing sense of a loss of meaning and hope for the future among the youth In the face of all this, Religion may offer a source of solace and security, with its doctrines of transcendence, including the promise of a better afterlife, thus tending to veer the attention of their adherents from the urgent tasks of our Earth community. This lecture will explore how Religion specifically Buddhism and Christianity, in dialogue with one another, may offer a vision and empowerment for healing our wounded selves and our wounded world.

About Dr. Rubin Habito:

Ruben L. F. Habito is Professor of World Religions and Spirituality, and Director of Spiritual Formation at Perkins School of Theology. Before coming to Perkins in 1989, he was a member of the Society of Jesus for twenty-five years, and taught at the Jesuit-administered Sophia University in Japan. A member of the American Theological Society and of the American Academy of Religion, he has also served as President and Board member of the Society for Buddhist Christian Studies, and of the Buddhist Peace Fellowship. He is the author of numerous books and articles in English and Japanese, including Be Still and Know: Zen and the Bible (2017), Zen and the Spiritual Exercises (2013), Healing Breath: Zen for Christians and Buddhists in a Wounded World (2006); Experiencing Buddhism: Ways of Wisdom and Compassion (2006) among others. He serves as Guiding Teacher of the Maria Kannon Zen Center in Dallas, Texas, where he resides with his spouse Maria Reis Habito. Together they have two adult sons, Florian and Benjamin.

# Betsuin Tea Talk - March 2023 Is It Almost Spring?

As I write this, the wind is howling outside, and the weather forecast calls

for freezing temperatures and lowland snow. It is hard to believe that in a few weeks, the daylight will be longer, the weather will get warmer, and the flowers will start blooming. Nevertheless, I am looking forward to the new season.

Spring Ohigan will be celebrated on March 12 at the Betsuin. It is also Daylight-Saving Time, which means you will get up an hour earlier to attend service. As an incentive to attend, a treat will be given to you in person after the service. Thank you to the Betsuin's Women's Association for providing the homemade delicacy.

Ohigan ("the other shore of enlightenment") celebrates the change in seasons and includes visits to ancestral gravesites to honor those who came before us. If you visit Japan during this period, you might see the flowers associated with Ohigan. They are called higanbana (the flower of higan) and are found blooming near gravesites. The flowers are red spider lilies. They are pretty but deadly, as the roots are poisonous.

Spider lilies can be equated with human nature. Each of us has poisonous thoughts and actions. The six paramitas associated with Ohigan reflections teach us to recognize and overcome these negative traits and welcome all life's blooms. The Six Paramitas or "perfections" (dana, self-discipline, patience, effort, meditation, and wisdom) are observed during the weeklong celebration of Ohigan. May your reflections on Buddha's teachings be meaningful to you.

The new season also welcomes renewed interest in the in-person events and programs that have been on hold for three years. Please see the temple's website for upcoming temple events.

# From Seattle Betsuin Archives THE DIGNITY OF THE ELEPHANT

"BEFORE AMIDA BUDDHA WHOM ALL ANGELS WORSHIP I HUMBLE MYSELF IN DEEPEST REVERENCE. IN HIS WONDROUS LAND OF BLISS - SURROUNDED IS HE BY COUNTLESS SAINTS."

Watching a travelogue showing an elephant walking through the woods one is impressed by the manner of his stride. A Monkey will leap about rather frantically from branch to branch. A Rabbit will race full speed ahead. A Bird may flutter and cry out. But the Elephant goes along with a dignified gait, sure footed and confident. Of course he is capable of getting angry and tearing up things, but ordinarily he appears steady and not flustered.

A Buddhist monk once wrote to "walk serenely on and on through life . . . . . .

You may say how can we walk serenely on and on when we live in what has been called a violent society... in which one race of people is trying to overpower or control another. When vast armies destroy ancient temples and historic places of great value. Where there is mass killings of innocent beings. When there is fantastic wealth and enormous poverty. When explosives wipe cities from face of the earth and make the soil unusable for many, many years to come. And starvation galore.

On the other hand this has been a very inventive era when man has gone from walking to horse and buggy to speed. He has developed amazing cures and medicines, really mind boggling to realize. If we stopped to think of life as a Wheel, ever turning and considered how we very early commence to show likes, dislikes, develop craving, passions, and rush through life blindly, it would be time well spent.

Further, if we could see how we allow greed and pride to control our minds . . . even up to old age, we'd see why life among us humans is as it is today. If we'd reflect upon the general aggressive and destructive behavior of man, we'd be amazed. Again, if we could bring ourselves to become aware of how we were (are) thinking, perhaps a grain of compassion and humility would enter our heart.

Finally to realize that regardless of all these conditions, we are still embraced in the Compassion of Amida Buddha, should not only make us very humble and thankful, but enable us to walk and on through life, with a certain dignity, which is not really ours, but a gift from Amida Buddha.

## Troop 252 News Submitted by Reese T. Save Animals to Be Human

Jon Kawamoto, the editor of the Wheel of Dharma, recently shared with me an amazing article and video from the Washington Post about a woman in Ukraine, who in the midst of the war there, returned to save the animals from her animal shelter.

Asya Serpinska is from the town of Hostomel, Ukraine, and was formerly a math professor. Upon retirement, she established an animal shelter that quickly grew to have hundreds of cats and dogs. With the attack of Ukraine, she was forced to initially flee, but then returned to rescue her animals at the shelter. Her surrounding area was bombarded and she said it felt like an earthquake. Russian soldiers confronted her and her staff, accusing them of assisting the Ukrainian army. When Asya's favorite beloved dog, Gina, barked at the soldiers, one soldier shot and killed her dog. She said, "Any dog defends its territory. It's their nature."

The soldiers threatened to kill her, and a staff member was bound and restrained on the floor overnight.

Asya even fed and took care of a lion and other animals from the local zoo that were also innocent victims of the war.

I was so impressed by something that Asya said in the video that ran with the story. She said, "To save animals is to be human."

The war and the attack on Ukraine, is a vivid example of what it means to lose one's sense of humanity. As we have seen on the news, hospitals, schools, residential areas have all been bombed and attacked, and innocent citizens from children to the aged have lost their lives. How can you do such things if you have any sense of humanity?

Asya, on the other hand, in saving the animals at her shelter, is affirming her humanity. Such an expression of her humanity is maybe stronger than the bullets and bombs being inflicted on the Ukrainian people.

Many years ago, I translated a book on Shin Buddhism from Japanese to English, by Hideo Yonezawa, a popular lay speaker in Japan. In his book, he

expressed that Shin Buddhism is the path to becoming truly human. The path of the Nembutsu is the path to becoming a true human being. I immediately recalled that expression when I saw what this woman in Ukraine was doing for the animals.

Other religions "assume" that we are human, but in Buddhism, we have to "discover" our humanity. In other religions, it is often thought that man was created by god to rule over the earth, over other beings like plants and animals.

In Buddhism, we are all sentient beings, no greater and no less than other beings. We were not made to rule the earth over other beings. In contrast, if it weren't for other beings, we couldn't live. If anything, it is the opposite. We should be bowing our heads in respect and gratitude for other beings that make our life possible.

In the midst of this terrible war in Ukraine, where we see what happens when human beings lose their sense of humanity, we also see a beautiful example of one person who is affirming their humanity by saving the animals. Asya Serpinska, in saving animals, is saving not only her sense of humanity, she is showing the entire world what it means to be human.
