

Rainy Days and Sunny Days

In Japan, June is called “水無月 *minazuki*”. “水 *mizu*” means water. “無 *na*” means nothing or empty. “月 *tsuki*” means month. “*Minazuki*” means the month of no water. June is the rainy season, and it rains every day. There is no water in the heavens. So, it is called “*Minazuki* (the month of no water). Another said that June in the western calendar is recognized as July in the Lunar calendar. It is already a hot summer in the Lunar Calendar. Because of the hot weather, water in the earth dries up. It is why June is called “*Minazuki*”. I also heard that “*Minazuki*” originally means “The month of Water”. It is the season to draw water into rice fields. It is interesting that there are various origins of the name of the month.

When I was in Japan, (especially when I was a child), I disliked the rainy season. The humidity was so high in my hometown, Nagasaki. It rained every day. There were always many puddles in the fields. I loved playing baseball, but I could not play it in June. A table and a corridor in a school were wet from humidity of the rains. I needed to wipe the tables when I got to school. I was always complaining, “Too much rain! I need a blue sky! No more rain, please!!”

In the rainy season, my father used to recite a poem in his Dharma Talk.

“When it rains, do not complain to the sky. When it is raining, we must live with the rain, naturally just as it is.

When it is a nice day, do not complain to the sky. When it is fine, we must live with the sunny days, naturally just as it is.”

I often remember this poem even after I became an adult. When I was a child, I wanted a nice day all the time. I really did not care about the poem which my father recited. But now I realize that the poem shows me how I am living and how I should live my life.

When it was raining, I complained to the sky “Stop raining”. When it was a nice day, I complained

to the sun, “It is too hot!” When I was a child, I was eager to become an adult soon. After I became an adult, I envied childhood. When I was fine, I envied someone who was sick because they could be absent from school. When I got sick, I stamped my feet in frustration because I could not go out to play with my friends. When some inconvenient things happened to me, I was always frustrated and complained about it. In honesty, my mind and view have not changed even after I became an adult.

Shakyamuni Buddha taught us that “Our life is suffering” which means that our life does not go as we want.” I understand this logic, but I cannot adapt it to my daily life. Therefore, I should pay heed to the poem. When it rains, I should be one with the reality of rain. I should just live in the moment of this rainy day. When it is a fine day, I should just live in the moment of a nice day.

In the same way, I should just live in the moment of being a young person. I should just live in the moment as my age. I should just live in the moment as a sick patient. I should just live in the moment when I feel happy, sad, fulfilled or in pain. I should just live in the moment today just as it is today. Before I complain about something, I should remember this poem. I may be able to change my mind and view. To live in the moment means to be with whatever that moment brings -- be it rain, hot sun, sickness or old age, without judgment. I just live and appreciate my life as it is. Gassho,

'Yasashii' and 'Kibishii': In Memory of Rev. Tetsunen Hirota

We recently lost one of our veteran retired ministers, Rev. Tetsunen Hirota. Allow me to share my message that I gave at his funeral.

I have a special connection to Rev. Hirota, as he served as a minister at my home temple, the Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple in Ontario, Oregon. Rev. Hirota served there when I was a teenager in my high school years. My parents were good friends with the Hirotas, and had dinner at their home on many occasions.

After spending five years in Japan studying Buddhism for the ministry, I came to have a real appreciation for the ministers who came from Japan to serve in America. They had to give sermons in English, leave their motherland, and work with both Japanese-speaking and English-speaking members. When I was younger, I was more critical of the broken English of the ministers from Japan.

But after I went to Japan to study for the ministry, I had a new appreciation for our Issei ministers and ministers who came from Japan. I could not read Japanese, write Japanese, or speak Japanese. I felt like a complete idiot. In my first two years in Japan, I was basically totally lost. I thought, "How did the Issei ministers do it?" Giving sermons in English every Sunday, going to meetings, talking with members — "How did they do it?" I realized that Issei ministers, like Rev. Hirota, even with their broken English, had a much higher command of English than I had of the Japanese language.

I have no memories of Sensei's sermons in Japanese when I was growing up because I didn't understand Japanese at all when I was young, but after studying in Japan, and becoming a minister at Orange County Buddhist Church, Rev. Hirota once gave a sermon in Japanese as a guest speaker that I have never forgotten.

Sensei talked about these two terms in Japanese — "yasashii" and "kibishii." They are contrasting terms. "Yasashii" means to be gentle or to be lenient. "Kibishii" is the opposite. It means to be stern, to be tough, to be

FOOD FOR THOUGHT *Vimalakirti and Manjusri were two famous and illustrious disciples of the Buddha. Both were exceedingly brilliant, wise, learned and most compassionate men. They held discourses, in which others stood in awe.*

At one time Manjusri said:

"If you desire this life, you are not really a spiritual person.

If you desire the rounds of worldly existences, you have not any real conviction about life and its true purpose.

If you desire an awakening just for yourself, this is not real understanding.

If you grasp at things, you have not the right view about life".

In other words, Manjusri saw the necessity of overcoming fierce desires, which keep us doing, saying, thinking in foolish and harmful ways. As long as we live we can't be totally desireless, but we can try to extinguish the blaze of the most fiery desires (of greed, etc.).

He saw how our conviction can waver and how we drastically need a steadfast heart—an unwavering and sincere heart. (We rely upon Amida to guide us in this respect).

He saw that if we selfishly think only of ourselves and our own goal, we have no real understanding about life. Someone wrote that if we cared only for our own salvation, it was far away. One needs to genuinely care. (A little bit more and more).

Something has to give in ones lives, somethings given up. It is necessary to eventually see life as a bubble, a mirage, all things subject to change.

*Thinking all of this over, where to start? Perhaps we should start towards our goal by **LISTENING**.*

LISTEN to the Teaching. **LISTEN** to the Voice of Amida as HE speaks to our hearts. If we do this sincerely, all else will follow.

His writing on Buddhism in America appears in *Lion's Roar*, *The Wheel of Dharma*, *Everyday Buddhism*, and *Religion in Los Angeles: Religious Activism, Innovation, and Diversity in the Global City*. He teaches at Windward School and UCLA where he earned the Distinguished Teaching Award.

Sydney Shiroyama (she/her) is a multiracial yonsei who grew up attending the Palo Alto Buddhist Temple (PABT), where she currently serves as a Certified Minister's Assistant, Dharma School Teacher, and board member. She works as a pediatric occupational therapist and is completing the Masters of Buddhist Studies program at Institute of Buddhist Studies. Sydney designs and facilitates taiko sessions for special education classrooms and self-advocates with Down Syndrome.

harsh. For example, growing up, maybe your mother was more lenient on you, but your father was more strict or tough. Or, maybe it was the other way around. Maybe mom was more “kibishii” and dad was more “yasashii.”

Rev. Hirota explained Shinran Shonin's character and spirituality in a manner that I had never heard before, using these two terms.

Sensei said that Shinran Shonin was a person who was “yasashii,” or gentle and easy on others, but was very “kibishii,” harsh or strict on himself. Sensei also explained that we are the opposite. We are harsh on others, but we are easy on ourselves. We are quick to criticize others, to blame others, especially when things go wrong, but when it comes to ourselves, we think, “It wasn't my fault. I didn't do anything wrong. It was that person's fault.” Shinran Shonin, however, was most critical of himself. His writings are a reflection of his deep self-introspection and self-reflection.

I had never heard Shinran Shonin characterized in this manner and so Sensei's message really struck me. It made me think about how many times in my life I have been “kibishii” with others and “yasashii” on myself. I should be harder on myself and easier on others. That is the spirit and character of Shinran Shonin.

It was an honor and privilege to officiate the funeral of a minister who had given over 40 years of his life to share the Dharma, to share the teachings in this country. I will never forget that wonderful message from Rev. Hirota on Shinran Shonin and how he was hardest on himself and was easy on others as opposed to being harder on others and easy on himself.
