

Account of A-Bomb, Part II - Rev. Tetsuya Ecchu

"Account of A-Bomb – Rev. Tetsuya Ecchu (the latter part of his article)"

Rev. Tetsuya Ecchu is my uncle who entered the Pure Land on September 25, 2021. He was a famous local historian in Nagasaki City, and everyone fondly called him "Ecchu Sensei". When the A-Bomb was dropped on Nagasaki on August 9, 1945, he was serving in the military at the age of 23. Today, I would like to continue to introduce his account of Nagasaki's A-Bomb which was written in 1994 (see the July 2024 Newsletter for the previous part).

Reviving Sunday Service and Fukuda Sensei *Yakushi-kai

I think it was around New Year's Day in 1946 (Showa 21), when there was still unrest in the wake of the A-Bomb. Mr. Iwane Matsuo (a member of Rev. Tetsuya Ecchu's family's temple, Kogenji) and Mr. Miyoji Matsuoka told me my friend, Sensei Minoru Fukuda, resumed Sunday School, "Yakushikai", at his house. "Yakushi-kai" was originally established to provide social education for youth. I had a close relationship with Sensei Fukuda as he had a similar job working for the Regional Legal Affair Bureau in Nagasaki. It was the first step to revive youth education in Nagasaki after the war.

Right after the war ended, the United States Occupation Forces' Administrative Officers came to Nagasaki as well as other cities in Japan. Mr. Winfield P. Niblo was assigned as the Commissioner for Cultural Affairs. His advisor was Professor Baiten Hori of Keio University. Before the war, Professor Hori received a Degree of Psychology from a Univer-

sity in the United States. Professor Hori had a calm personality and always spoke gently to the youth group. He listened to our concerns and mediated between us and the United States Occupation Forces.

Forming a Youth Association in Nagasaki

At that time, because of my new sense of life after being demobilized and from being youthful, I put most of my energy to advancing democratic education. I was involved with local youth group activities, helped to revitalize Kogenji Temple's Sunday School (Hikari Kodomo Kai), engaged in various supporting programs for war orphans, and more. Now, I feel that it was not like me at all to do such things.

If I remember correctly, Mr. Akiyama (I do not remember his first name) was the one who organized the Nagasaki Youth Group's Representatives Conference. Mr. Akiyama was a civil servant for Nagasaki City. Many youths attended this conference from various districts. I still remember Mr. Taguchi, Mr. Mine, Mr. Iwanaga, Mr. Yamaguchi, Mr. Takemoto, Mr. Uchino, Mr. Matsunaga, and more who lived near Kogenji Temple also attended.

The post war reconstruction **Bon Odori (Bon dance) festival in Nagasaki was brilliantly held at the Motodaiku-machi city ground (the current site of the Nagasaki City Hall). One of the Bon Odori song's lyrics was "Bonda Bondayo Manmaru Tsukini---(Obon, Obon, perfect round moon---)". I hear this song is still sung today and is being used as an Obon Dance somewhere.

Obon in 1946, lonesome ***Shoro-bune

It was time for *Hatsu-bon* (first *Obon*) for the Atomic Bomb victims on July 15, 1946. Although we were running short on all materials and foods, our

district (Irabayashi 1 District) decided to make the Shoro-bune for our loved ones. People donated nails, colored papers, and whatever they had. We went to get some straw and bamboo and made Irabayashi's traditional "Moyai-style" boat. It started raining in the early morning because it was the rainy season. Fortunately, the rain stopped before 9:00 PM when the Shoro-bune was launched. All the younger people carried the boat to the Nagasaki Port.

(Nowadays, most Shoro-bune have wheels, but people actually carried the boat back then. People started installing wheels on Shoro-bune around 1960. Obon was moved to August from July in 1952. Reference from Nagasaki Broadcasting Company.)

The Soban bell (Sho style bell for Shorobune) sounded sad. There were no fireworks and less candle light. I could only see a few lanterns. It was a totally different scene from today's Obon and Shoro-bune. It was my memories of Obon after the War.

*Yakushi=Bhaisajyaguru Buddha or Yakushi Nyorai, the Buddha of healing and medicine **bon/Obon=one of Buddhist holiday and major services. It is also an occasion to remember our loved ones. Generally, people believe that our loved ones come back to this world during obon. 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we observe the passing of all who have come before us... I am

writing this article on Sunday night, having just returned

home from our 92nd Bon Odori. What a wonderful event! Thank you so much to Bon Odori committee chair, Ron Hamakawa, and everyone on the committee for pulling together Bon Odori. While some things were missing or different, it was still a Kangi-e (歓喜会), gathering of joy. Special thank you to all the volunteers who made the event possible. Otsukaresama deshita. I truly learned the meaning of Obon when I accompanied Rimban Kusunoki to conduct cemetery Obon services the week before. Our first stop was Mt. Pleasant Cemetery on Queen Anne. There we conducted a service at a small monument dedicated to 23 Japanese railroad workers who were killed in a train accident in 1909. As I chanted the Juseige, I thought, "why are we conducting a service for people who probably don't even have any family in Seattle?" Later that day at Lake View Cemetery Rimban Kusunoki gave a Dharma message where he told the story of his uncle in Japan conducting the first Hatsubon service after the Atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki. Only the ministers were in attendance because whole families had perished in the bombing and there were no relatives alive to mourn the loss of their loved ones. At that moment I learned the significance of our Obon service; we observe the passing of all who have come before us, not just our loved ones. It was then that I understood why we should always hold an Obon service at Mt. Pleasant, even if there is no one else there. Namo Amida Butsu




