# Account of A-Bomb by Ms. Sonoe Taketa, Hiroshima A-Bomb Survivor

# The 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bomb.

In 2025, it is the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bomb. I work together with the Seattle Hiroshima

In 2025, it is the 80th anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bomb. I work together with the Seattle Hiroshima Club to introduce the account of A-Bomb delivered by Hibakusha who has connection to Seattle. On this occasion, we learn from the tragedy which happened 80 years ago and think about "Peace".



On August 6, 1945, I was 8 years old in elementary school in Hiroshima, Japan. There was a beautiful blue sky that morning. As my third-grade class was starting around 8:00 AM, I suddenly saw a blue and white flash fill the whole classroom. This was followed by a second frightful explosion at 8:15 AM. We didn't know what had happened. We got down under our desks for safety. My whole body was shaking. My ears started ringing. My teeth chattered. After staying 30 minutes under the desk, we were told to go outside.

I couldn't believe what I saw outside. The blue sky had turned black. I saw a mushroom-shaped cloud, stretching up above a 400-meter hill in front of us. Even though the hill blocked the city, I knew that the city was on fire. After 2 hours sitting on the ground, some burned debris started flying over us and the black rain started. We were dismissed from school. I walked home in the black rain. When I arrived home, I was soaked with the black rain. My face, body, and clothing were all black.

Two months later, I was told that the black rain had a high content of radiation. Not until then, did we learn that the atomic bomb had been secretly built by the Americans. It was dropped by the B-29 bomber Enola Gay, destroying Hiroshima city. It was estimated up to 150,000 people were killed instantly; most were civilians. Three days after the Hiroshima bomb was dropped, Nagasaki city was destroyed by another atomic bomb, killing instantly 74,000. Later, many more from both cities died with serious injuries, burns, cancer, and other effects of radiation exposure. The school was 5 miles from the hypocenter. I feel that I had survived the Hiroshima bombing due to a 400 meter hill that protected us. I was exposed to radiation but did not have any serious injury from the bombing. Since the 1945 Hiroshima bombing, the Hiroshima and America Joint Atomic Bomb Research Center started. I received information about the genetic effects of atomic radiation exposure that could cause cancer.

I decided that it is necessary to pass on my experiences of the atomic bombing for the next generations. This is why I am writing down my experience. In 2012, my then 16-year-old granddaughter asked me for an interview about my experiences during the Hiroshima atomic bombing. She told me that she had been researching this at the library. I was surprised that she asked me for the interview as I had never talked about my experiences with her before. She told me that her school curriculum did not teach about the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings. She interviewed me with the camera and recorder. She called me to tell me that her presentation was well received by her class and teacher. They did not know about the tragedies she presented about the atomic bomb war history but praised her for her presentation.

In Japan the tragedy of the war has been taught in public school for almost 80 years. Even today the living survivors visit the schools to share their experiences of what happened during the atomic bombings. They teach a message to never repeat atomic bomb war in the future. I, too, feel it is necessary to pass on my experiences in the 1945 atomic bombing of Hiroshima for future generations. I hope by sharing my experiences of the bomb devastation, future generations will not repeat the past. Atomic and nuclear weapons must be avoided for the future of humanity.



College students were asked to reflect on a Buddha's teaching, "hatred ceases not by hatred but by love" quoted from a representative from Ceylon (Sri Lanka), Finance Minister, J.R. Jayawardena at the treaty of San Francisco in 1951.




