

Account of A-Bomb by Hachiya Momoe

The 80th Anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bomb.

2025 is the 80th anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bombings. Together, with the Seattle Hiroshima Club, I will



Before the A-bombing, I lived in a dormitory of the Japan Red Cross Hospital. The dorm was in Minami Senta machi. I was a student at the nursing school. I was doing demonstrations or something like that. I never thought the bombing would come. I heard air-raid alarms many times, though. We had many firebomb attacks in Hiroshima before then, but our dorm was not damaged until Aug. 6. It suddenly happened on the morning of Aug. 6.

In the morning of August 6, 1945, some of the nurses at the Red Cross Hospital had diarrhea, caused by malnutrition. We ate only soybean rice or kaoliang [sorghum] rice. Many nurses were infected with dysentery. The dorm became like a dysentery ward.

I was in charge of sterilizing dishes. Outside, three of us sterilized dishes over fire. At the time of the bombing, we were resting under the eaves. It was so hot, and we needed a rest. Because of this, we didn't get burned. Otherwise, we would definitely have gotten severe burns. Because we used a fire for sterilization, if we had stayed near the fire, we could have been killed. Because I was hiding behind the building, I didn't even get burned.

The dorm was made of wood, so it completely collapsed. Many nurses were trapped under the collapsed dorm. Probably Tanaka-san, too. We rushed away from the damaged building. I did not have any burns. I was lucky.

After the bombing, the head nurse was rescued from the dorm. She felt responsible for the damage, and said to the non-injured nurses "Work, work..." So, we gathered at the entrance of the hospital from outside. This is the picture of the Japan Red Cross Hospital before World War II. Atomic bomb victims were coming to the entrance. Their numbers gradually increased. We, non-injured, were engaged in relief activities. The entrance to the hospital was full of those victims. Everybody laid down, cried for water; gee, it was such a miserable scene. Seeing such disastrous conditions of A-bomb victims, I deeply appreciated my good luck. I took care of the victims every day. "Work, work, you non-injured fellows…"

For about a month... moving from place to place, we helped doctors who were engaged in treatments. I can't remember how I managed to get food. There was no place to eat except the basement of the hospital. The dorm was totally collapsed.

After that, the head nurse gave me permission to go outside in October. My parents' house at Misasa was entirely burnt down. With no place to go, I visited my uncle at Yamaguchi prefecture for a few days. That's it. We were not allowed to move about freely. Even though my younger brother died, I couldn't go home to find him without the head nurse's permission. Head nurses had much authority.

My grandmother and younger brother died from the bomb. My grandma was on volunteer labor, called "Kaoku-sokai," which made fire breaks to stop fires, by destroying some houses. She went to Koami-cho which is very close to the hypocenter. Everything was destroyed near the hypocenter. There was no way to find her. The same with my younger brother; on his way home from school, the school building fell down upon him. There was no way to find him. I couldn't even ask the head nurse to go out. I stayed in the hospital and took care of the victims.

The victims had very severe burns. It was different from normal burns. Their heads behind the ears were full of maggots because it was hot in the summer. And their faces -- half of their faces were burnt. And their hair -- if they had had on black hats, they went bald. Their situation was so pitiful. When I saw them, I realized my good luck. Their presence itself was pitiful rather than horrifying. Such victims came into the entrance of the hospital. Everybody laid down there. That's all.

Many of them died. There were not enough crematories for them. We put their bodies on tin plates, bodies unidentified, then lit pieces of wood on them and cremated them. Otherwise, these bodies would soon decay.

Some people had burns covering their entire backs. Kikkawa-san who was well-known as the first A-Bomb victim, came to our dermatology department. He was burnt all over his back, the entire back, indeed, along with his head. I can't find words to describe his misery.

Unless all nuclear weapons in the world are eliminated, someone might use them. I would like to make people aware of how horribly the use of A-bombs can affect mankind, because only those who are actually involved in A-bombings really know the devastation caused by it. I would like to appeal for the ultimate elimination of all nuclear weapons in the world



Chairperson Tyler Announced that Seattle Betsuin won the Tri-Temple Softball Tournament for the second consecutive year.




