# Account of A-Bomb by Kiyoko Nakanishi

## The 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bomb.

2025 is the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-Bombings. Together, with the Seattle Hiroshima Club, I will



introduce the account of A-Bomb *Hibakusha* survivor who has a connection to Seattle. On this occasion, we learn from the tragedy which happened 80 years ago and think about "Peace." Kiyoko Nakanishi was aged 4 at the A-bombing. On August 6<sup>th</sup>, 1945, my elder sister came back home to get something, I was standing under the eaves. I can't remember why I was there. After the A-bombing, my body was soaked with something like oil, according to my mother. I don't know if it was oil or so-called "black rain." According to my memory, all the walls of my house were blown out, and only the flames were left. I remember my grandpa picked cigarettes found on the ground. Soon after that, we were afraid of the approaching fire, and decided to evacuate to the bamboo grove, which was a ten-minute walk from our house. On the way, a lot of debris were scattered such as tiles, wood and glass. It was very hard to walk. My mother made pumpkin rice that morning. We took it to the bamboo grove. When we slept on the bamboo grove, I remember that I felt pain because the bamboo stubble stuck in our bodies. I don't remember what kind of shoes I put on. I only remember we walked on the very bumpy road.

My house was burnt down and wasn't rebuilt at that time because my father was not with us. Right after the Abombing, we moved to the hometown of my father's brother-in-law where was in Minochi in Yuiki-cho. After moving there, my younger sister and I suffered from a disease, something like children's dysentery. And we lost our hair according to my mother. It must be side effects of the

radiation. We were hospitalized for almost one month. Then, we stayed at the uncle's house until my father came back from the military. My mother had a really tough time to get food for us.

After my father came back, we could no longer stay at the uncle's house, so we came back to the place where our house was. We could not afford to build a new house. My father brought a bus from somewhere and slept in the bus for a while. In the meantime, my father came up with the money and rebuilt a house little by little. We lived in the bus for quite a while. After the A-bombing, we had food distribution at a bank in *Yokogawa*. A-bomb victims went

went there to get food. When I went there, the white wall of the bank turned black. It was not because it was burned, but because of flies. When somebody came close to the wall, it turned white. Flies gathered all over the wall. When I came across the wall, the flies went away, and the wall became white again. Flies bred as such. When we got injured, the injury crawled with maggots. I remember the skins of A-bomb victims were like tattered clothes hanging from their arms. Their skins were burnt and hung. It was an inferno.

I entered Oshiba elementary school, which was several blocks away from my house. There was food distribution from the U.S. to our school like a cup of raisins to each of us. We had classes outside. Because there were not enough classrooms for everybody, we used them in turns. We got raisins, and also compact sewing kits. They gave us such things. We cultivated the school yard and planted potatoes or so. Sometimes we found human bones buried in the school yard. Because many people were killed by the A-bomb, their bodies were cremated at the corner of the school yard. So I remember the smell. When I was an elementary school student, human bones were found buried in the school yard. It was horrific.

Our life didn't get better. I was poor because of the A-bomb. We shared the tools for calligraphy or painting with my siblings because we could not afford to buy them for each of us. We did not live comfortably. Then, I went to Nakahiro junior high school in Yokogawa. Our life had improved a little bit. However, if others knew I was an A-bomb survivor, they looked at me weirdly. Even in Hiroshima, because not everyone in Hiroshima was a victim of the A-bomb. So, I never told to anybody that I was an A-bomb survivor. I felt very bad about it. There was discrimination against the A-bomb survivors. It was said in Japan if A-bomb survivors married, their children would be disabled. So, I never mentioned about the A-bomb then. (The researchers proved that radiation has no influence over the survivors' offspring.)

Because I experienced the A-bomb, I don't want my children or grandchildren to have the same suffering as I had. I hope for a world free from war.

Dharma Exchange Grace Tazuma and Gary Shibata shared slides showing the history of the arson restauration project from January 2, 2024, the date of the second and worst fire, to the present date. They started by saying that everything in the Hondo and Memorial Hall was affected by smoke and soot.

Leanne Nishi-Wong headed the remediation phase which included removal of ozone, asbestos and lead, and preservation of archives. This lasted from January 2024 to September 2024. An ice blaster was used in the basement to help deodorize the garage.

Grace and Gary have been leading the restoration phase which has involved, among other things, updated wiring to bring electrical to code, structural and seismic reinforcement work, painting, insulation, and flooring, as well as new security features and audiovisual equipment.

Grace and Gary thanked Alan Hoshino for his electrical and mechanical support, Leanne Nishi-Wong for her remediation work, Alex Sakamoto for his work on the AV updates, and the many volunteers who stepped in to paint, move furniture, load and unload objects going to and coming from Japan and made it possible today to be anticipating a grand opening in the spring.






